

Manpower Development, Training Courses Scheduled by Oregon Groups

More than 1350 individuals will be trained or retrained under new courses through the Manpower Development and Training Act which were approved in Salem last week by the Oregon Department of Employment and Oregon State Department of Education which handle the joint MDTA program in Oregon. Robert Dybas, manpower development specialist with the Bureau of Employment Security, Seattle, and John Rue, U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare field representative, signed the approvals of 16 MDTA projects scheduled for Portland, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Bend, North Bend, Pendleton, The Dalles and Ontario.

Eldon Cone, director of Oregon State Employment service, acted for the Department of Employment which will select the trainees and William Loomis, director of vocational education, represented the State Department of Education which will set up the training courses in various parts of the state.

Two Youth Programs Planned

Included in the courses approved were two special youth programs—250 trainees in logger training at North Bend and a multiple occupation program at Eugene. The North Bend course for logging entry workers will draw 250 trainees from any part of the state. The training will be given at Southwestern Oregon college at North Bend.

TV Lets OSU Speech Students See, Hear, Improve Themselves

Television helped Oregon State university students improve their speech-making spring term by letting them see themselves in action.

The self-evaluation was often painful but always helpful, according to Professor Thurston E. Doler of the speech department. A Seattle electronic supply center loaned the video-tape equipment to the university for the pilot study.

Under the project, students delivered their talks for the TV camera as well as classmates and the professor. The next day, they saw and listened to themselves on video-taped programs.

Along with the advantages to the students, the TV film reduces the time the professor must spend in student speaker evaluation, Doler observed.

He believes the experimental project may point the way to better teaching—at less cost—in the future.

The OSU speech department hopes to continue the promising experimental project next year. Working with Doler on the project were Harold M. Livingston, chairman of the OSU classroom television committee, and John W. Keltner, head of the speech department.
