**Importance of Tourists!**

If you think that tourists have taken over, you aren't very wrong. Oregon's total population is about 1,800,000. Yet, last year more than six million travelers visited our state. This year the State Highway department predicts between seven and eight million tourists from other states and provinces will be on our streets and highways.

The Traffic Safety and Education division of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles points out that many of these drivers will be unfamiliar with Oregon's traffic laws and with particular driving conditions.

The driver from the flatlands of Kansas, for instance, has probably never encountered unexpected patches of tulle fog. He's used to straight-line, level road driving and may become confused on twisting mountain roads.

You can't depend on the out-of-state driver to know the local trouble spots, dangerous curves and blind intersections that you've grown up with. His panic stop may put you into the middle of an accident if you're following too closely.

Make allowances, too, for the fact that the house-trailer you're meeting or passing may be driven by a man who may be tired, may have been drinking or may never have towed a trailer before in his life. Don't crowd him. Give him room and when you do pass him don't cut in too sharply or he may swerve off the road taking the trailer and his wife and kids with him.

Be courteous to Oregon's visitors. It's worth it in more ways than one. By giving the right of way (even though it might legally be yours) you may save your life as well as his.

Oregon's visitors spend an average of \$7.81 per day per person. This figures out to more than \$162 million revenue to all of us each year.

Even if you're not in the resort, restaurant or motel business, a good share of this money funnels back to you through regular retail channels. And, the tax money tourists leave behind helps build more roads and highways you can use and enjoy all year around.

The Traffic Safety and Education division also suggests that, in addition to being courteous to visitors, you be helpful if the opportunity arises. If a traveler asks you for directions or information, give him all the help he needs.

Encourage him to visit local spots for fishing, camping, sightseeing. If each visitor stayed just one more day, it would add another \$70,000,000 to Oregonians' income.

Drive with care. Drive courteously and defensively. And, remember when you start to get impatient with that tourist up ahead trying to make up his mind, the shoe may be on the other foot when you take your trip next month.
