Report Reveals High Level State Economy

The department reported an accelerated rate of industrial expansion, especially in growth of diversified manufacturing. In the past two years, the report said, there have been a total of 209 new industrial plants and plant expansions, with a total investment of close to \$200 million. Included were 106 new plants for a total of \$111.5 million and 103 expansions accounting for \$85 million.

"This is the highest for any two-year period for which records are available and probably the highest in the state's history," the department said.

Among the growth industries in manufacturing during the period were pulp, paper and paper products, nine projects and \$90.6 million investment; plywood and veneer, 21 projects and \$27.5 million; particleboard and hardboard, nine projects and \$15 million; chemicals, 16 projects and \$14.5 million; fabricated metals, 19 projects and \$8 million; food products, 24 projects and \$7 million; electronics, five projects, \$6.2 million; machinery and equipment, 25 projects and \$5.1 million.

New Industries Listed

While established Oregon industries were responsible for the biggest share of the states industrial growth, Oregon has been attracting more new industries to the state, the report said.

Among the newcomers were Monsanto Chemical corporation, Reichold Chemicals, Ash Grove Lime and Portland Cement company, the 3-M company, Martin Metals division of Martin Marietta, Reliance Varnish company, Steel Container corporation, the Boeing company and Lee Millwork.

Overall strength of Oregon's economy is reflected in the flow of outside capital into the state, the department said. It is estimated that more than \$500 million in outside capital has been committed to Oregon investments during the two years, going into residential developments, office buildings, shopping centers, motels, resorts, manufacturing and distribution buildings, and other developments.
