Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Friday For Esther M. Leuck, Former Nyssan

Funeral services for Esther Marie Leuck were conducted Friday morning, July 17, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Ronald Hedwall of the Vale Lutheran church. Mrs. Leuck succumbed early Tuesday morning, July 14, at her home in Cottage Grove following a sudden attack.

She was born July 14, 1919, at Harrisburg, Ore., a daughter of Guy and Lillian Buck Moore. The deceased attended schools at Butte Falls, Ore., was graduated from high school there and was also a graduate of the Franklin School of Nursing at San Francisco. She moved with her family to Nyssa in 1942.

On Jan. 11, 1957, she was united in marriage to Hubert Leuck at Faith Lutheran church in Nyssa. The couple resided here until December 1961 when they moved to Cottage Grove.

Mrs. Leuck was a registered nurse and worked the first shift at Malheur Memorial hospital when it opened in October 1950. She served at the local hospital for 11 years and was head nurse for six years prior to leaving Nyssa. She was a charter member of district 20, State Nurses association of Oregon.

In addition to Mr. Leuck of the home, she is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Lorraine Liles of Eugene, her father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Moore of Nyssa; a brother, Kenneth of Nyssa; one sister, Mrs. Ruth Snead of Drain, and two nephews.

Her mother preceded her in death on Oct. 20, 1954.

Books on Religion Head New List Available at Malheur County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, July 25, at Malheur county library include the following:

"6,000 Years of the Bible" by G. S. Wegener. Using a historical rather than a theological approach, the author discusses the Bible as part of the fabric of Western civilization.

"The Recovery of the Person" by Carlyle Marney. A discussion of Christian humanism that maintains that the Trinity must be considered in human terms.

"The Fourth American Faith" by Duncan Howlett. A book concerned with the beliefs held by 50 percent of the Americans who do not belong to any organized faith.

"Red Carpet at the White House" by Wiley T. Buchanan. The behind-the-scenes story of great people and great events by the chief of protocol during the Eisenhower administration.

"The Desert King" by David Hawthorth. A biography of Ibn Saud.

"On to Kilimanjaro" by Brian Gardner. An account of the first World War in East Africa.

"Paul Tillich" by J. Heywood Thomas. A former student of Tillich introduces and evaluates his philosophic thoughts and theological ideas.

"It's Your Money" by Ladislav Farago. An account of waste and mismanagement in government spending.

"The Green Felt Jungle" by Ed Reid. The book looks behind the scenes at Las Vegas—the operators, the services they offer and the known and unknown who are their willing customers.

"Ballots and Bandwagons" by Ralph G. Martin. The exciting events behind five major political conventions.

"Parapsychology" by J. Gaither Pratt. A comprehensive view of how the parapsychology movement has advanced over a period of 80 years.

"The Craft of Woodcuts" by John R. Briggs. How to make woodcuts, wood engravings, linoleum blocks, stencils and how to print and appreciate them.

"The Population Dilemma" by the American Assembly. Eleven contributors survey issues of population trends and prospects in underdeveloped countries and in the U. S.

"The Fallen Sky" edited by Saul Arnow. Medical consequences of thermonuclear war.

"I Was Dancing" by Edwin O'Connor. A review of the year in which 78-year-old Daniel Con-sidine, a onetime vaudeville performer, has been an uninvited and increasingly unwelcome guest in his son's household.

"Gamailis" by Vladimir Andreyev. Tales from Stalin's Russia.

"Julian" by Gore Vidal. A biographical novel of the fourth cen-
