**Unemployment
Decreases in State;
Ontario Area Up**

The lowest rate of insured unemployment for mid-July for the past four years was reported last week by the Oregon Department of Employment office in Salem. The rate of 2.8 percent compared to 3.8 percent in 1963, 3.5 in 1962, 4.1 percent in 1961 and 2.9 in 1960 for the same period, the department said.

The rate and number of insured unemployed was also lower than four weeks earlier in June when weeks claimed totaled 14,126 compared to 11,942 weeks for the week ending July 16. The rate four weeks ago was 3.4 percent. More than 15,500 were claiming unemployment insurance for the same week a year ago.

Lowest rates of insured unemployment in mid-July were at Hillsboro with 1.9 and Baker with 2.0. Highest rates were at Hood River with 7.0 percent and Ontario with 7.5. At both Hood River and Ontario, food processing work is at a seasonal low.

Rates in the larger areas compared to a year earlier show Astoria at 3.2, down 30.6 percent; Corvallis at 2.2, up 31.6 percent; Eugene at 2.8, down 53.9 percent; Klamath Falls at 3.5, down 57.9 percent; Medford at 3.3, down 14.2 percent; North Bend-Coos Bay at 3.6, down 64.1 percent.

Pendleton and Milton-Freewater at 2.4, down 54 percent; Portland at 2.2, down 15.5 percent; Salem at 3.0, up 1.5 percent.

Biggest improvement over last year was at North Bend-Coos Bay where the rate went down from 10.3 to 3.6 this mid-July.

The Oregon Unemployment Insurance Trust fund contained \$73.2 million on July 17 compared to \$57.7 million a year earlier.

**Red Cross Bloodmobile Unit Slates
Wednesday Drawing at Eagles Hall**

Red Cross bloodmobile will be at the Nyssa Eagles hall on Wednesday, Aug. 5, according to Dennis Bingaman, chairman for the sponsoring Jaycees. Hours for the drawing are from 2 to 6 p.m.

Quota for the August drawing has been set at 150 pints which is 50 units less than for the Jan. 3 visit.

It has been reported that the local hospital used approximately 50 units of blood during the first six months of this year. An additional 240 pints of blood were also used during the first five months of the year in the form of gamma globulin and other blood derivatives.

Until the past several drawings, the Nyssa-Adrian area could boast of an excellent record as it has had the reputation of always surpassing the scheduled quota.

In January of this year, a shortage of 51 pints was noted and in August 1963 the drawing netted only 123 units or a 77-pint shortage of the 200-pint quota.

**Onion Pink Root
Control Measures
Sought in County**

Tentative plans for future onion research and evaluation of onion disease controls were discussed Thursday afternoon, July 23, at a joint meeting of directors of the Malheur Onion Growers association and Oregon State university officials.

Dr. Edward Vaughan, professor of plant pathology at OSU has been directing and spearheading onion research studies in this area for possible control measures for onion pink root. He will be on an overseas assignment doing pathological research work in New Zealand for the next 13 months.

Dr. Vaughan, therefore, met with the onion directors so as to formulate plans for continuing the onion research work here in the county during his absence. The county onion growers help finance the pink root program.

Onion directors present at the meeting in the county extension office included Joe Saito of Ontario, Roy Hirai of Nyssa, George Hironaka of Oregon Slope and Charles Joseph of Weiser. Others attending included Steve Besse, county extension agent.

After evaluation of the pink root trial plots is completed this year, the promising materials will be included for further observation in fumigation trials this fall. Two plots treated with various chemicals were examined by the OSU pathologists and chemical company representatives. It was too early for accurate evaluation which will be made at harvest time in measuring yields.

From Norway

ADVENTUROUS is the word to describe Svein Rolf Lier, Nyssa's next exchange student, who will arrive in New York on Aug. 15 from his home in Telemark, Norway. Upon his arrival in Nyssa, he will reside with Ralph and Ethel Lawrence and their son, Brian. The exchange student has cycled around many of the European countries including Denmark, Germany, Luxembourg, Belgium, Holland, Wales and Berlin. He speaks fluent English and German and understands Danish and Swedish. The young man is 17 years old, 5 feet, 7 inches tall and weighs 134 pounds. He prefers to be called Rolf and lists his favorite sports as skiing and cycling. He is also an amateur photographer and collects stamps of the world. After graduation he plans to enter the profession of philology (language and literature).

**Senate Votes Cut
To 5-Year Average
On Meat Imports**

The U. S. Senate Tuesday passed a bill by the overwhelming majority of 72-15 to limit imports of meat.

The livestock industry has been fighting for cut-backs on imports of beef, veal and mutton for many months. The Johnson administration has been strongly opposed to any laws governing them. Critics maintain that it would mean increased prices for consumers and hinder the position of the U. S. government in trade expansion talks now going on in Geneva.

Imports Force Prices Down

Backers of the bill say that foreign meat has taken 11 percent of the U. S. market during the past year and that this has been the main factor in the drop in prices.

The bill now goes back to the House of Representatives where the administration hopes to kill the measure.

Under terms of the Senate bill only the average shipped into the U. S. over a five-year period of 1959-63, inclusive, would be permitted. It is estimated the reduction would be 30 percent of the total shipped here in 1963.

Sensors from Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Utah all voted for the bill and local Congressman Al Ullman also favors it.

Victims of Politics

Stockmen feel that they are the victims of politics—this being an election year and the administration being well aware there are a lot more consumer voters than there are beef-producer voters.

Senator John J. Williams of Delaware stated that the Department of Agriculture has a vindictive attitude because of farmer opposition to federal controls.

To back up his statement, Williams, during committee hearings on the bill to limit imports, read from an article in the Oct. 10, 1961, issue of the Denver Post, quoting former Assistant Secretary of Agriculture James Ralph: "We welcome all beef imports South America, New Zealand and Australia want to send until the cattlemen get all the free enterprise they want."

**Federal Land Bank
Growth Continues
In Malheur County**

Federal Land Bank association of Ontario has just completed a record year of service to farmers and ranchers in this area.

During the 12-month period ended June 30, 1964, the association extended \$1,685,000 of long-term mortgage credit, bringing to \$7,239,000 the amount of credit outstanding on June 30, Dan E. Roberts, association manager, reported last week.

Roberts said the association's loan volume during last year represented a five percent increase over the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963. It was the biggest year in the history of land bank service in this area.

Of the total loan volume, \$1,440,000 was new money used to purchase land and livestock, make improvements, pay for operations or refinance other indebtedness.

Roberts said the association makes and services loans for the Federal Land Bank of Spokane in Malheur, Payette, Washington and Adams counties.

**New \$250,000 Corporation in Nyssa
Will Provide Seasonal Employment
For 25 Workers; Add \$50,000 Payroll****Midwestern Wholesaler Joins Local Men
In Buying, Selling Area Onions, Potatoes**

Incorporation papers were approved Monday for Treasure Valley Growers and Sales, Inc., with Nyssa as head office.

Stockholders are listed as Nash-Finch Co., Minneapolis, Minn.; H. L. Pace, Nyssa; Art Hamanashi, Ontario; Kaz Yamaguchi, Vale; and Maylin Maxfield, Nyssa.

Maxfield will be manager of the firm that proposes to buy and sell onions and potatoes produced in the area. They will operate their own business at the Owyhee Produce shed in the south part of Nyssa and buy from other packing sheds.

The office will be at the same location as the shed and Maxfield says the firm will be accepting applications for workers Monday and will be in operation very soon. He says at the start the company will furnish employment for 20 to 25 persons about eight months each year with three or four on a year-around basis and it will add a payroll of approximately \$50,000 to the area.

The Nash-Finch company is recognized as being one of the largest wholesalers of fruits and vegetables in the U. S. with plants and sales offices over much of the country.

Manager Experienced Operator

Manager Maxfield has about 28 years of experience in various phases of the fruit and vegetable business. Until he resigned the first of June 1964 he had been local manager for Muir-Roberts in Nyssa for 11 years and had served five years for the same firm as buyer and field man, working out of Salt Lake City.

For 12 years prior to that he had worked as federal and state inspector of fruit and vegetables in Colorado and Utah.

He is well-known over the area and says his firm will work very closely with other packers and shippers in moving potatoes and onions out of Treasure Valley.
