Farm numbers may be on the downside but ownership of livestock brands is climbing. That's what the State Department of Agriculture says as it prepares to mail more than 16,500 application forms for brand renewals during July.

Once every five years, Oregon requires brands to be re-recorded to keep them alive and legal. If they aren't re-recorded, another person can come in and scoop up a brand owned for umptysteen years.

Five Well-Known Hemingway Books Available at Nyssa Public Library

According to City Librarian Joy Bell, five of the late Ernest Hemingway's books were recently added for circulation at Nyssa public library. They include:

"The Snows of Kilimanjaro," "Old Man and the Sea," "The Sun Also Rises," "In Our Time" and "For Whom the Bell Tolls."

Other new books are:

"Marooned" by Martin Caidin. In a gleaming, bell-shaped capsule orbiting the earth in harsh vacuum at more than 100 miles altitude, Project Mercury astronaut Richard J. Pruett is marooned in space. The failure of his retrorockets to fire and start his capsule's return to earth has doomed the American astronaut to death by asphyxiation. He has only 43 hours of oxygen left.

"Main Street" by Sinclair Lewis. Here in a declared war on complacency and pettiness the author lays bare the hypocrisy and self-seeking too often hidden behind the facade of quiet Main street lives.

"John Keats" by Walter Jackson Bate. In this authoritative biography—the first full-length life study of Keats in almost 40 years—the man and the poet are portrayed with rare insight and sympathy. In spite of a scarcity of factual data for his early years, the materials for Keats' life are nevertheless unusually full.

"Tender Is the Night" by F. Scott Fitzgerald. This is the story of Dick Diver, a young psychiatrist whose career was thwarted and genius numbed through marriage to the exquisite and wealthy Nicole Warren. On the outside their life was all glitter and glamour, but beneath the smooth, beautiful surface lay the corroded falseness of their social values and the tragedy of her disturbed mind.

"We, the People" by United States Capitol Historical Society. Change is the nature of a demo-

cratic nation, but change acquires meaning only from the nation's unchanging ideals. These ideals, embodied in the Constitution, acquire in the Capitol the physical symbol of their continuity. Governments come and go, but the Capitol remains to bear witness to the glories—and follies—of the past . . . and to keep before our eyes the promise of the future.

"William Shakespeare" by A. L. Rowse. Certain of the revelations here supply information crucial to Shakespeare's whole development and central to an understanding of his work. Others solve problems which have long bedeviled critics. Yet even more meaningful for the general reader

"Tales of the Frontier" by Everett Dick. The 80-odd stories in Everett Dick's "Tales of the Frontier" depict different phases of frontier life during the period—roughly 120 years—which saw the penetration and settlement of the mighty stretch of land lying between the Mississippi and the Pacific.
