Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

GRASS STAINS AND SUMMER DAYS

... seem to go together. Our county extension offices receive many calls for help with this problem. The right treatment has saved many a garment — and money, too.

To remove stains, dampen fabric and work detergent into the stain, then rinse. If the stain remains and the fabric can take it, use a chlorine bleach.

Or, if safe for the dye, sponge the stain with alcohol. It's best to test an inconspicuous part with alcohol first. For acetate fabric, dilute alcohol with two parts of water.

WHAT ARE "MEAT TENDERIZERS"?

... made of? If they tenderize meat, won't they harm the stomach?

Virginia Weiser, extension nutritionist at OSU, says these products are enzymes from papaya fruit. The U. S. Food and Drug administration considers them safe for use on foods which are to be cooked.

The enzyme is destroyed by heat when meat is cooked. In case any should not be destroyed by cooking, they would be made inactive by the gastric juice of the body.

PLASTIC WADING POOLS

... may be unsafe for children if not properly cared for. The water becomes stagnant and the walls covered with slimy film if not scrubbed each week.

Turn the pool bottoms-up to drain. Swish up a pail of hot suds and brush-scrub the inside walls. Give special attention to crevices where sand and dirt collect beneath the inflated rim. Rinse the pool with a hose before refilling.

MATTRESS STAINS

... can usually be removed with "dry suds." To make this, whip detergent and water with an egg beater to give a stiff lather. Scrub the stain using only the foam. Next sponge the mattress surface with a solution of ammonia and water.

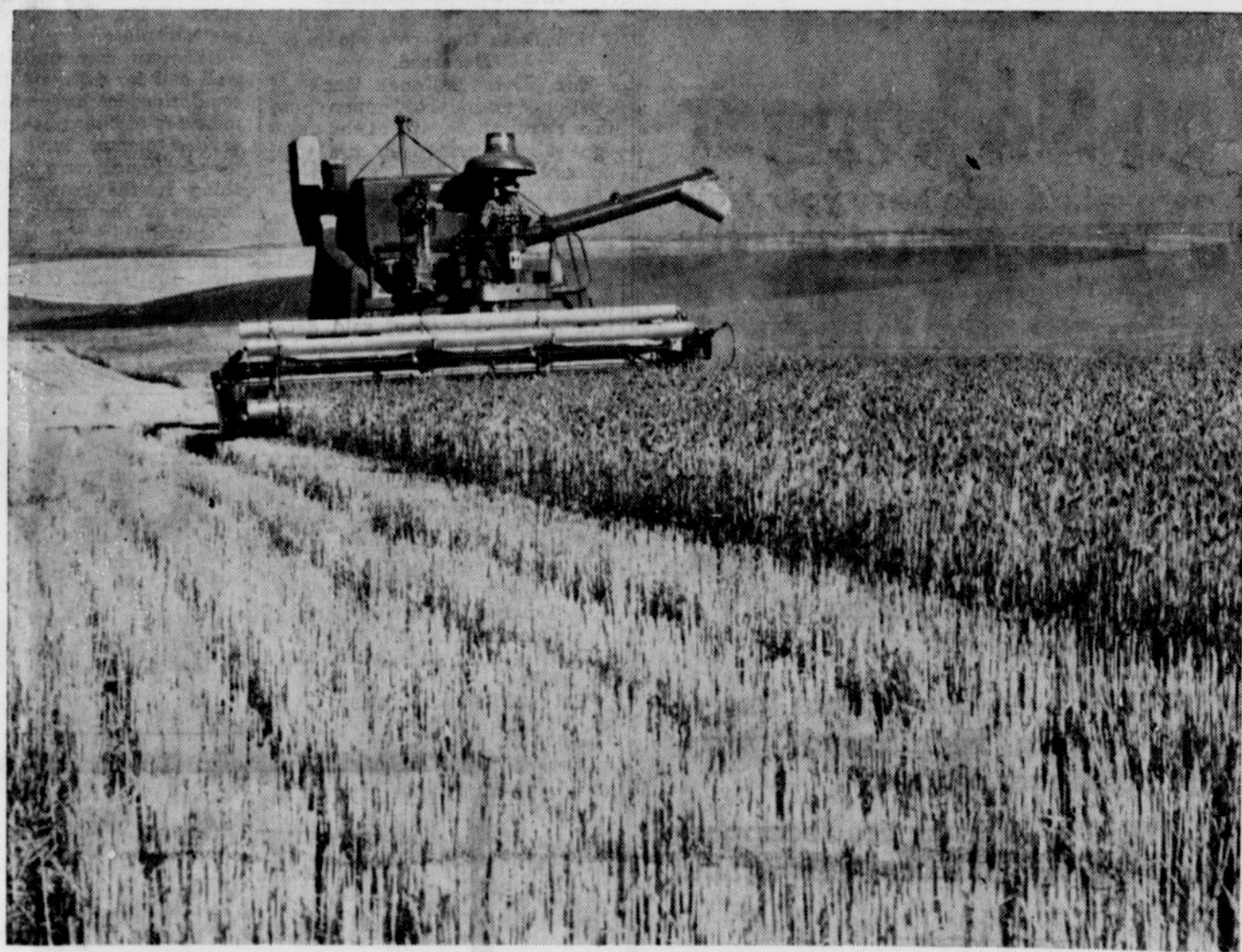
