Brucellosis Down In Oregon Cattle

Less than three-tenths of one percent (0.289) of Oregon cattle tested for brucellosis were reactors during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964. A year ago 0.42 percent were reactors.

Figures on the state-federal disease eradication program released by the Oregon Department of Agriculture show 122,386 cows in 38,481 herds tested during the fiscal year just ended with 354 reactors.

A year ago the number of cattle tested was 144,474. These came from 45,393 herds. Total number of reactors that year was 608.

Seven counties had no reactors. These counties were Benton, Clatsop, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Sherman and Wheeler. The latter county has not had a reactor since the fiscal year ending in June 1960.

Calf vaccinations jumped to 168,800 for the fiscal year just ended from 155,250 the previous year. However, fewer herds were represented in the vaccination figures, with 9,529 this year compared with 10,641 a year ago.

Malheur county continued to lead in the number of calves vaccinated, with 20,326 recorded for the year just ended, compared with 17,585 a year ago. This county followed the state trend in number of herds represented, dropping to 862 herds this year from the 917 of the fiscal year ending in June 1963.

Malheur county totals on the tests showed seven reactors.

Robert Atwood, Alaska newspaperman and amateur musician, had just put his trumpet to his lips when the earthquake hit. Running outside, he found himself on the ground, arm and trumpet buried shoulder-deep in rubble. To extricate his arm, he had to surrender the trumpet.

One trumpet: a small loss. Perhaps.

The earthquake damage was confined, fortunately, to limited areas. Alaskans are fighting back. Engineering tests are being made to locate safe sites for rebuilding. Materials and equipment are pouring in. Despite a short building season, Alaskans plan to have rebuilding well along by Christmas. Ambitious — but very Alaskan!

Alaskans are going about their jobs. In damaged areas, merchants are supplying their customers.

Schools, hotels and public services are functioning. Alaska's splendid visitor attractions and accommodations are open and inviting.
