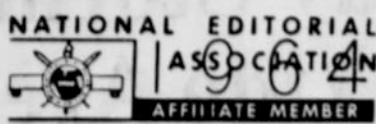

Troubles! Troubles! It seems the whole world is troubled — nations, states, cities, rural communities and just plain people — and all during a time when no major wars are (supposedly) going on anywhere.

Europe is worried about Russia first and trade second. Asia is torn with strife and we take part in a "no-win" war where we have no positive plans of where to head.

South American countries are bothered with Castro, unstable governments and poverty.

The U.S. is bothered with trying to "mother" all the world and furnish it finances. We're still concerned with our image abroad. On the home front we are bothered with riots in spite of passage of the Civil Rights bill. Northern states are getting more than their share of these while the South is relatively quiet.

The states are concerned now over the Supreme court ruling that calls for redistricting—which in turn takes representation away from the rural sections and places it in urban areas. Cities are concerned over transportation problems, rising crime rates and poverty.

President Johnson is spending at the highest peace time rate in history and with his anti-poverty program, medicare, social security, etc., is trying to eliminate all financial problems of all people. Yet he tells us he has an economy

program spending \$2 million per day more than the Kennedy administration.

But like the beef producers—they are outnumbered by the consumers so the latter are considered more in legislation. There will be more recipients of government aid than taxpayers, if the programs continue to increase.

But why worry if the federal debt has gone beyond \$300 billion — as one county official here said recently, "It will never have to be paid."
