

Rainbows Planted in Upper Cow Lake Show Excellent Gain in Brief Period

According to Larry Bisbee, southeast regional aquatic biologist of the Oregon Game commission, on July 28 the fish population in Upper Cow lake was sampled by nets. It was found that the 100,000 three-inch rainbow fingerlings stocked on April 14 this year are now averaging 7.8 inches (fork length).

Payette County Fair, Rodeo Set To Begin Aug. 19

The Payette county fair and rodeo is set to begin Wednesday, Aug. 19, and will continue through Saturday evening, Aug. 22, at the fairgrounds in New Plymouth.

According to reports from Ben Wherry, fair board chairman, this will be one of the finest programs ever presented for residents of the area. Hundreds of exhibits are already entered, with more anticipated by opening day.

Three big nights of rodeo are scheduled for Aug. 20-22, with many cowboys planning to participate in the RCA-approved event. Starting time for rodeo performances is 8 o'clock each evening.

An added attraction in this year's rodeo will be a kids' miniature calf-roping event. Over 48 entries have already been accepted from junior contestants 14 years of age or under.

Youngsters interested in entering the kids' event may do so by signing up at the rodeo hall in New Plymouth Monday, Aug. 17, through Wednesday, Aug. 19.

The annual fat-stock sale will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Friday. Weigh-in of animals will be from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. and 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Aug. 18 at the railroad yards in New Plymouth.

Copies of the premium list books for the fair are available at the Payette Independent-Enterprise office, Payette Valley Sentinel plant in New Plymouth and at the Violet Mercantile store in Fruitland. There is no charge for these books.

On Thursday evening, Aug. 20, there will be a fair parade at 7 o'clock down Main street in New Plymouth. Floats, riding clubs, the New Plymouth high school drill team, visiting dignitaries and Miss Payette County will be among parade participants.

This gives the fingerlings an average growth rate of 1.37 inches per month since being stocked, which is excellent, Bisbee said.

Upper Cow lake was chemically treated in the fall of 1963 to remove an abundant rough fish population. Additional stocking of fingerlings in the lake will be completed later this fall, the biologist said.

Fingerling or fry-trout releases during July in Malheur county were as follows: Upper Cow lake, planted July 17, cutthroat species, 89,878 fry size; Malheur river (Riverside to Harper, southside diversion), planted July 19, 64,480 2.3-inch rainbows.

Antelope reservoir, planted July 19, 33,620 2.3-inch rainbows; Rock Creek reservoir, planted July 19, 2,000 2.3-inch rainbows; Malheur river (Riverside to Harper, southside diversion), planted July 23, 94,136 4.5-inch rainbows.
