ARE ARTIFICIAL SWEETENERS SAFE

... for use by "normal" persons? The labels on these products say they should be used only by people who must restrict their intake of ordinary sweets.

Virginia Weiser, nutrition specialist with the OSU Extension service, explains that moderate use of artificial sweeteners is safe for anyone.

However, sugar is an important part of the normal diet. Under the present food and drug regulation issued in 1941, substitution of artificial sweetener for sugar in foods for general use would constitute "adulteration."

Miss Weiser further explained that in recent years, artificially sweetened foods are used not only by diabetics but also would-be weight losers. For this reason, the Food and Drug administration is considering a possible revision of the clause "only by persons who must restrict their intake of ordinary sweets."

Most people do not need to use artificial sweeteners, says Miss Weiser. However, she cautions that if you do use them, "moderation" is important to avoid developing a taste for highly sweetened foods.

SUMMER HITCHHIKERS!

... Beware of roaches which often ride into homes by way of large cardboard cartons in which your grocery order is carried.

Double check these boxes to be sure there are no insects in the crevices. Don't stack them in the kitchen or storeroom where pests can easily get well established.

CONSUMERS ARE ASKING FOR BETTER PACKAGING

... and labeling of foods, cleansers and other household goods. And from the looks of things their voice has been heard—or at least a start has been made.

We searched the market and found a few detergent makers now have changed their labels and put the weight on the front of the package where it can readily be seen. The type is easier to read, too.

More will follow suit, it was learned at the Soap and Detergent association meeting in New York a few months ago.

Some coffee brands now show the weight in large numbers. The same is true for many cereals. Progress is being made but old packages and labels have to be exhausted first.

IF YOU TANGLE WITH POISON IVY OR OAK

... don't neglect washing your clothing as well as the exposed areas of your body.

Garments become contaminated with the plants' irritating oils, so it's not safe to wear or handle them until after laundering.

WANT TO BEAT THE SUMMER HEAT?

... Here are some suggestions from researchers of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Install metal or canvas awnings. They'll reduce the heat coming through windows by 70 to 75 percent. Light-colored awnings with open sides are better than closed dark ones.

Louver or bar screens will reduce the heat 90 percent through south windows not otherwise shaded. They are 55 to 75 percent effective for east and west windows.

If your house is still in the planning stage, see that there's an overhang or extension on the south wall.

Select a light-colored roof. Use light-colored shades, draperies and blinds.

WHEN YOU USE A PESTICIDE

... check up on your safety rules.

Don't get pesticides on food, dishes or cooking utensils.

Keep children away from areas where these products are applied. Remove aquariums, pets and their food and water before applying a pesticide.

Oil base sprays will soften asphalt tile floors, some linoleums and plastics.

Read directions on labels carefully. If they warn against breathing pesticidal mists or dusts, open windows and doors before applying them.

Store the products in a safe place . . . NEVER under the sink, in the pantry or medicine cabinet.

CAN YOU TELL A FRESH EGG?

... Mrs. Velma Seat, extension food marketing specialist at OSU, gives these clues to freshness.

The white should be thick and cloudy; the yolk should stand high. Check to see if there is white rope-like material attached to the yolk. This is a sign of freshness.

Are hard-cooked eggs hard to peel? The fresher the egg, the more reluctant it is to part with its shell after cooking.
