Mr. Mayer, a former resident of the Adrian area, succumbed Aug. 13 at his home in Portland after suffering a recent stroke.

He was born June 5, 1893, at Erie, Pa., a son of John and Mary Daub Mayer. He attended schools in Erie and went to Portland in 1908. On May 18, 1937, he was united in marriage to Ruby Moses in the Rose city. She is a sister of Archie Moses of the Adrian area.

The deceased was baptized into the Lutheran church, had worked as an elevator operator and during World War II was employed in the shipyards.

According to relatives, his favorite rule of life was, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

In addition to his widow, Mr. Mayer is survived by one son, George E., residing at home, and a sister living in Oberlin, Ohio. Four brothers preceded him in death.

Dairy Princess Tells Jersey Club Members Of Recent Activities

Malheur county Jersey Cattle club held its regular monthly meeting Aug. 9 at the Vale city park.

Miss Dianne Walz, Malheur county Dairy Princess, was a special invited guest and after a picnic dinner she spoke to members and guests present, emphasizing the importance of the dairy industry in general and use of dairy products.

She also told of her experiences and activities in Portland during June when the state dairy princess was selected to represent the Oregon dairy industry at various statewide events and to compete later in a national contest.

Miss Linda Schield, representative dairy princess from Coos county, was selected by judges as Oregon Dairy Princess of the year during state competition.

Princess Dianne also showed pictures of events in which she has taken part as county dairy princess, along with brochures and a scrapbook pertaining to her reign in that official capacity.

Assistant Director of Ag Department Predicts Increase in Feed Lot Cattle

Oregon cattlemen and feed lot operators will tend to produce more of the meat the state's residents consume in the future.

This is the prediction of J. W. Southworth, assistant director of agriculture in Oregon for livestock services.

In making this forecast of the future trend in the livestock industries of the state, Southworth points to the fact that as of July 1, 1964, there were 14 percent more cattle on feed lots than the same time in 1963.

In contrast to this the 11 western states showed only a one percent increase and in the 28 states in which there is a significant amount of cattle feeding operations, the number in feed lots July 1 of this year was down three percent from last year.

Winter Feeder Figure Doubles

The comparison of the number in feed lots in Oregon this July 1 showed 48,000 while a year ago there were 42,000. Southworth points out that summer months are low months for feed lots and that the number on feed lots by the fall and winter months can be expected to be about double the summer figure.

Also pointing to more Oregon grown beef is the bumper crop of 662,000 calves this year, an increase of some 11,000 over 1963.

Southworth estimates that less than 200,000 of this year's calves

will be used for herd replacements and notes that this means over 400,000 will find their way into channels that will lead to slaughter within the next 18 months.

More Consumed Than Produced

The assistant director points out that the upward trend in cattle feeding should continue because of the state's large production of feeder steers (some 300,000 annually) and an annual consumption of choice beef that is in excess of the amount presently produced in the state.

He commented that the increase will be more rapid if feeders can get the prices on feed grains stabilized and soybean meal reduced as a consequence of the present efforts to reduce freight rates on these commodities from the Midwest.

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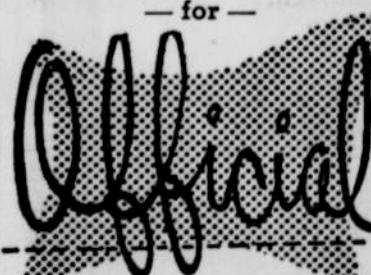
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
