Regular Fall Hunting Season Opener
Slated for Saturday, October 3; Deer,
Chukars, Hungarian Partridge LegalWaterfowl Shooting to Begin October 10
With Pheasant and Quail Due October 17

Starting Saturday, Oct. 3, the fall hunting season will open with deer, chukars and Hungarian partridge all legal game. Duck and goose dates will be one week later with pheasants and quail set for Oct. 17.

The state game commission estimates over 300,000 hunters will be in the field during the months to come seeking one or more of the types of game.

School Census
For Basic Support
Due on October 25

October of each even-numbered year is when the school census is taken. As a start toward compiling the census by his office, Clerk Dirick Nedry said that forms have gone home with each child in school to be filled out by his parents.

The number of children residing in the district on Oct. 25 determines how much money the school district will receive in basic school support funds, county school funds and other smaller amounts of money distributed on a census basis. For this reason it is very important that every child be listed, and the job requires the cooperation of every parent in the district.

More Beet Dirt Needed

Nedry also said that the school district hopes to receive enough beet dirt this fall to cover the south half of the elementary playground so that grass can be planted next year. The area has been fenced off, and beet haulers are asked to dump behind the elementary school building if they have beet dirt to dispose of.

Beet dirt hauled onto the school grounds in the past has made it possible to grow good, solid turf; and it is hoped that the elementary field can be completed next year and get the children out of the dust and mud, Nedry added.

Building Program
For Area College
Granted Approval

Treasure Valley Community college has been given approval of the Oregon legislative emergency board to begin Phase I of the college building program.

This final approval by the legislative board provides for construction of a 16,500-square-foot academic-administration building on the 90-acre TVCC campus site, remodeling of the golf club house for a library facility and equipment for the buildings.

Total cost of the project is estimated at \$318,292. Funds were derived from a local serial levy and from the state bond issue for higher education passed last May.

Also approved was construction of a 10,700-square-foot technical building which will be constructed with pending federal matching funds under the Federal Higher Education Facilities act.

Construction on these projects is expected to begin sometime after the first of the year. At the present time plans are being drawn by Smith and Keys, college architects, for submission of bids for construction.

Directly in front of the middle rescue craft is Tolliver's floating boat and his head bobbing out of the water. Cars, spectators, boating participants and Parma Jaycees can be seen on the east bank of the river. Tolliver will be presented with a hard-luck trophy by the sponsoring Jaycees.

Local Hospital Board Members Vote
To Hire Administrator-Anesthetist
To Replace Charles Smith, ResignedApplicant Now With California Hospital
Has 18 Years of Experience in This Field

Malheur Memorial hospital board members voted to accept the application of Joseph P. Love as administrator and anesthetist to replace Charles J. Smith, resigned.

The decision was made at a special meeting Wednesday afternoon in Brownie's cafe after individual board members and the town's four practicing physicians had expressed opinions. Motion was made by Vic Haburchak and seconded by Tom Drydale with the vote being unanimous. Salary for the two positions was set at \$10,500 annually.

John Stam, president of the board, was unable to contact Love following the meeting, before Journal press time; hence it was not known if he were still available.

Love's application shows he is 40 years of age, married, has three small children and is presently engaged as anesthetist at Rideout hospital in Marysville, Calif. His home is in nearby Yuba City.

Experience, Training Listed

Love is a certified registered nurse anesthetist, having graduated from Grace School of Anesthesia at Detroit, Mich., in 1952. He says he is licensed to practice in Texas, Michigan and California and has a total of 18 years' worked in hospitals.

He served as local anesthetist at Malheur Memorial for a three-week period in August and September and his work was well-liked by local physicians.

If he accepts the appointment, he will take over about Nov. 1 and will be looking for a three-bedroom house to buy or rent.

Plans Announced
For Yearly Drive
Of Scout Funds

Tentative plans have been made for the annual Boy Scout fund drive in this, the Oregon district. Community chairman for this year's activity is Emil A. Stunz who will be assisted by local businessmen.

Target date for this drive is Oct. 15. Each year funds are needed by the Ore-Ida council to sustain more than 5000 boys in scouting. Local area residents will be contacted personally to assist this movement.

All funds collected will be used by the local council to aid in character building and physical development of young men of the community. Adrian and Owyhee will conduct their drives at a later date. Glenn Ward is the Adrian community chairman and Bob Haney is chairman for the Owyhee area.

Maughan Notes Changes in Program
For Educational Aid to War Orphans

Children of living veterans who are totally and permanently disabled from service-connected causes may now participate in the federal war orphans education assistance program, according to Joseph S. Maughan, Malheur county veterans service officer. Maughan said such children should contact him immediately for assistance in filing applications if they expect to enroll in college under the program this fall. His office is located at 210 Emison avenue, Nyssa.

The program, administered by the Veterans administration, formerly applied only to those children whose veteran-parent died as a direct result of service in the armed forces.

Benefits for Eligible Children

The new law, passed in July, now extends the program to children of the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, the Korean conflict and peacetime service who have been both permanently and totally disabled by illness or injury attributable either to their wartime service or, in the case of peacetime veterans, to disabilities received in line of duty.

Eligibility may also be established in those cases where the veteran died while a disability so evaluated was in existence, even though the death was not due to the service-connected disability.

\$110 Per Month Available

The law provides for benefits up to \$110 a month for full-time enrollment and proportionately lower for part-time study for eli-

Sugar Processing
Started Tuesday
At Nyssa Factory

Steam rising from Amalgamated's Nyssa sugar factory was a welcome sight to area residents Tuesday morning. It meant the employment of some 550 workers for a period of approximately 6½ months for a payroll of approximately \$1,800,000.

It also means a market for the farmers' multi-million dollar beet crop. Last year with the world price of sugar much higher than for many years, area growers received \$1.10 per ton more than in the previous year for a total of \$800,000 additional returns.

5,500-Ton Daily Capacity

Approximately 4,000 tons were harvested Monday and about 5,000 tons Tuesday. The plant processed about 5,000 tons the first day and expected to near the 6,500-ton daily capacity by Thursday or Friday, according to District Manager Ray Larson.

Larson said the harvest would probably be controlled from the end of this week until about Oct. 20 when it is hoped the weather will be cool enough to permit stockpiling.

Double-shift operations were accepted at meetings in all districts Wednesday night of last week. The receiving stations will be operating from 16 to 24 hours daily in all districts and farmers will be delivering their individual beets one-half of the time.
