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... It's rather old and worn. Is there anything I can do to get a better shine?

Old linoleum sometimes gets porous and may not take a high shine when you apply self-polishing wax the first time. Try a second waxing.

But the secret to a good shine is to let the first coat dry at least four hours. Then apply another very thin coat. Push the wax applicator in only one direction on the floor. Don't rub back and forth.

And don't shake the can of wax—this makes it foamy and gives an uneven shine. These directions are for the self-polishing type of wax.

"SHAVE TWO BARS OF HOME MADE SOAP

... in a wash boiler, add clothes and boil."

That was the wash that was in 1914. And that was the year that the Extension service was born. Cotton and linen were the only fibers in the wash basket. Dresses scraped the floor.

During these 50 years, homemaking has undergone drastic changes. So have Extension programs.

Way back when, we demonstrated how to make soap at home. Now we have research to help you decide which of the many detergents, bleaches and starches are best suited for washing the variety of fabrics in your automatic appliances.

Free bulletins are available on detergents, starches and bleaches from your county extension agent ... And, by the way, we don't recommend boiling the family wash.

SLEEPING BAGS

... will soon be packed away for the season. Think twice before putting a sleeping bag in a coin-op dry cleaning machine.

Dry cleaning may leave harmful fumes in the padding. An inadequate drying cycle leaves large residues of the cleaning fluid. A serious hazard could result to anyone sleeping in the bag.

Be safe. After cleaning, carefully sniff the bag for possible vapors. If not free of the solvent odor, put the bag through another drying cycle. Or it can be put outdoors to air until all traces of odor are gone.

IF I WASH AT THE COIN-OP LAUNDRY

... could my family pick up a disease from someone who used the washer ahead of me?

In some cases this might be possible, say research scientists at the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

They find that hot water and soap or detergent do not kill all disease-producing bacteria and some could be left in the washer.

TO BE ON THE SAFE SIDE, USE

chlorine bleach when washing fabrics which can take it. This serves as a disinfectant. See directions on the bottle. For other fabrics, you may use a pine-oil disinfectant.

SCARE AWAY WOULD-BE

BURGLARS WITH LIGHT

... If you expect to be away from home, get one of the electric eye kits which will turn on a lamp when darkness falls. It's completely automatic and the light will turn off at dawn. Any table or floor lamp can be plugged into this device which needs no installation.



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
