G. Havelock Emslie, a lifelong resident of South Africa, will present the program at the Oct. 14 meeting of the Knife and Fork club.

The dinner session will be held at 7:30 p.m. at East Side cafe in Ontario and all reservations are to be made through the secretary or by card.

From Emslie, a direct descendant of pioneer British stock who emigrated to South Africa from Scotland in 1820, will come current data on the part of Africa that all have heard so much about but relatively few have had first-hand news.

The program shows picturesque towns, modern cities, gold and diamond mines, native war dances, wild lions, impalas and elephants pictured in their native haunts—with great danger to the life of the photographer. Some of the animals were photographed from as close as six feet.

Emslie is claimed to be a rare combination of Frank Buck and Burton Holmes. "He brings 'em back alive—in pictures, and reveals stirring scenes of modern African life."

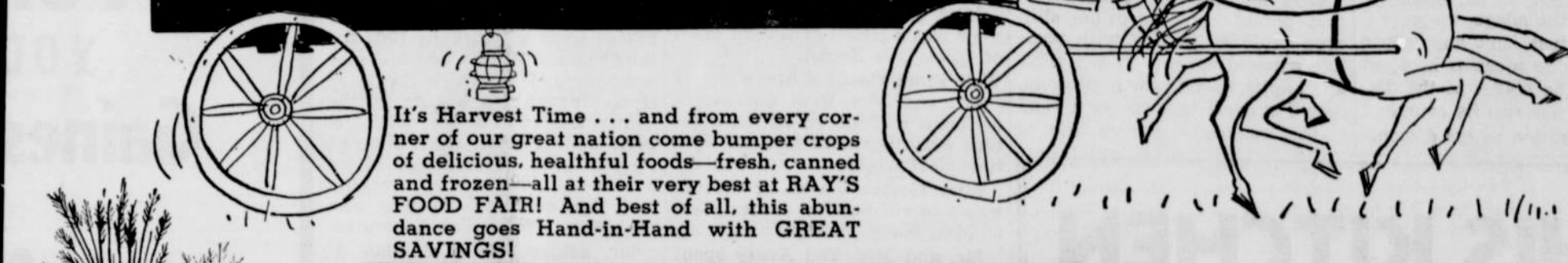
Blaine Girvin of Vale was recently elected 1964-65 president of the Knife and Fork club and Jack E. Leafgren of Vale was named new director.

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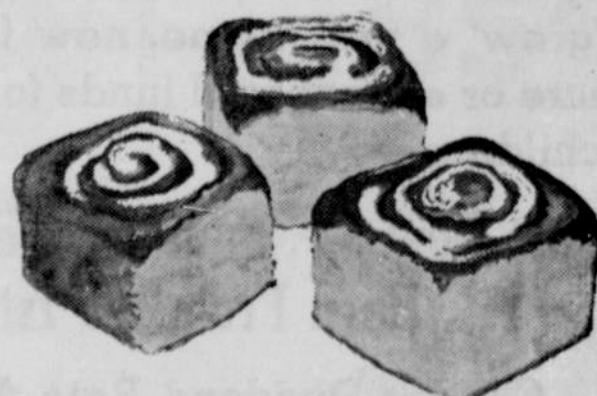

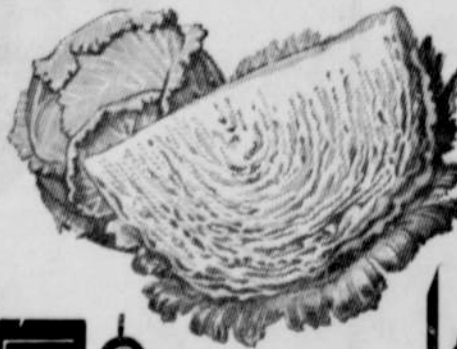

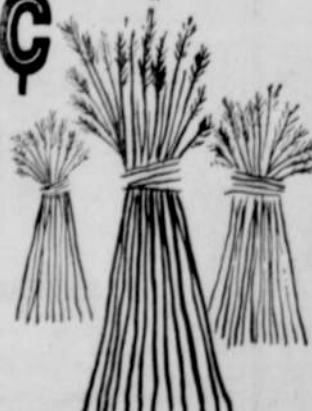
