Thomas Evans Dies Following Illness; Rites Held Saturday

Funeral rites for Thomas Evans were conducted Saturday morning, Oct. 17, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of the Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Evans succumbed Wednesday, Oct. 14, at his home in the Nu Acres community, following an extended illness.

He was born Sept. 16, 1874, at Coffeyville, Kan., a son of Ezer and Mary McKay Evans and at the age of four years crossed the plains with his parents over the Oregon Trail, settling at Wallowa, Ore.

The deceased later moved to Idaho and had resided in Long Valley, Boise Valley, Caldwell, Meadows and Franklin.

He was united in marriage on June 11, 1905, to Lucy Charlotte Ball at the home of her parents in the Franklin community near Caldwell.

Mr. Evans was a member of the Christian church. During his lifetime, he had farmed, worked as a ranger in the Payette National forest and taught school at Meadows.

The Evans' returned to their original homestead in the Nu Acres community in 1942 and had resided there since.

In addition to his widow, Mr. Evans is survived by two sons, Cecil of the Nu Acres community and Thomas of Livermore, Calif.; five daughters, Mrs. Rena Caward and Mrs. Alice Ross, both of Caldwell, Mrs. Doris Keck and Janis Evans of Nu Acres, Mrs. Mary Ballard of Hayden Lake, Idaho.

Other survivors include a brother, Taylor Evans of Springfield, Ore., 31 grandchildren and 35 great-grandchildren.

Burial was made in the cemetery at New Plymouth under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Active pallbearers were Harley Sager, F. A. Johnson, Robert Shaw, Mike McKague, John and George Smit.
