Secrets of Outer Space Considered In Newest Books at Malheur Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Oct. 31, at Malheur county library include the following:

"Exploring the Secrets of Space" by I. M. Levitt. A recapitulation of the reason for space exploration, fundamentals of astronomy and conjecture on the possibilities of life in space and space politics.

"A Survey of the Moon" by Patrick Moore. A complete guide to the moon that includes its geography, geology and movements.

"Universe of Science" by Charles-Noel Martin. The author attempts to describe the sum of man's knowledge of the universe.

"Anatomy of Liberty" by William O. Douglas. The author attempts to answer the question: Can man, through the rule of law, survive the nuclear age?

"Craft of Intelligence" by Allen Dulles. The author discusses his work with the CIA and OSS citing such accomplishments as the establishment of Nazi contacts during World War II and the development of the U-2 high altitude photographic plane.

"Voices Through the Iron Curtain" by Allan A. Michie. The Radio Free Europe story.

"So Fair a House" by Daniel Castiel. A look at the how and why of Synanon, a much-discussed foundation that operates four treatment centers for drug addicts.

"Health Progress in the U.S." by Monroe Lerner. A survey of 20th century health advances in the United States.

"Everyone in This House Makes Babies" by Sheila Solomon Klass. An anthropologist's wife records her enthusiastic involvement in local life during the year her husband was working in the interior of the island of Trinidad.

"Delights of Photography" by Georgina Reid. A complete manual on photography designed for every member of the family.

"The Fortress" by Catherine Gaskin. The story of a Yankee privateer and a Russian-Finnish aristocrat caught up in the Baltic sea battles of the Crimean war.

"Black Robe" by John Upton Terrell. A biography of Pierre-Jean de Smet, missionary, explorer, pioneer.

"Painting Portraits" by Helen Olsen. How to capture likeness and personality.

"Professional Story Writer and His Art" by Robert C. Meredith. An organized presentation of techniques used by professional story writers.

"White Cockade" by Vincent O'Brien. A historical novel that deals with the settling of Canada and the battle of Quebec.

"You Only Live Twice" by Ian Fleming. The British agent, James Bond, goes to Japan for his most exciting and bizarre adventure to date.

"The Stone Angel" by Margaret Laurence. A 90-year-old woman clinging to the last sparks of independence, recalls her life as a frontier girl, wife and mother.

"Norman Thomas" by Harry Fleischman. A biography of the man who has been presidential candidate of the Socialist party six times, a tireless worker for civil rights and a leader in the evolution toward disarmament and world peace.

"Socialism Re-examined" by Norman Thomas. The author reassesses the Socialist crusade which he has led for nearly 40 years.

"Communism and Colonialism" by Walter Kolarz. A collection of essays based on a series of scripts which the author prepared for the European Service of the BBC. Intelligent Anti-Communism of high order.

"Revolt in the Mafia" by Raymond V. Martin. A revelation of the facts about crime and corruption in New York City by one of America's top "cops."

"Revolution in Biology" by John Maddox. The story of the development of the new science of "molecular biology."

"New Paths in Biology" by Ruth Nanda Anshen. A discussion of the cell and cellular formation and development.

"The Pond" by Robert Murphy. Winner of the 1964 Dutton Animal Book award.

Agricultural Changes to Be Revealed By National Census Beginning Nov. 9

How much agriculture in Oregon and throughout the nation has changed in the last five years will be revealed by the 1964 farm census, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist. Census enumerators will begin collecting data Nov. 9 in Oregon.

Although the census taker won't call until then, the census taking process has already started, Mrs. Horrell notes. Farmers have already received forms, or soon will, to be filled out before Nov. 9. When the enumerator calls, the farmer can get any help he may need in completing the form.

Since 1920, the government has taken a census every five years to up-date information about the nation's agricultural resources, explains Mrs. Horrell. Census information can be used for statistical purposes only. No fact can be revealed about an individual farm or farmer, she stresses.

Shows Changes in Farm Picture

Although everyone knows there have been many changes in Oregon agriculture in the past five years, this is the first opportunity for a grass-roots check on changes in the rapidly shifting farm picture since 1959, she points out.

The new census will be an up-to-date inventory of all farms in Oregon by counties. It will tell the amount of land used for crops and pastures, the quantity and kinds of crops harvested, kinds of equipment used, the number of poultry and livestock and other pertinent facts.

Farmers need the data in order to understand where they fit into the big business of which they are a part. Farm organizations need the information in order to speak intelligently for farmers on

political and economic matters, it was noted.

Manufacturers and retailers selling to the farm market need to know the size of their market and its needs. Federal and state agricultural workers are anxious for census information describing the exact situation on American farms in 1964.

In short, Mrs. Horrell points out, "information about agriculture is necessary to the good management of our farms, our businesses and our government. Cold, hard facts are needed to meet the demands of change."

The Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, is responsible for taking the agricultural census.

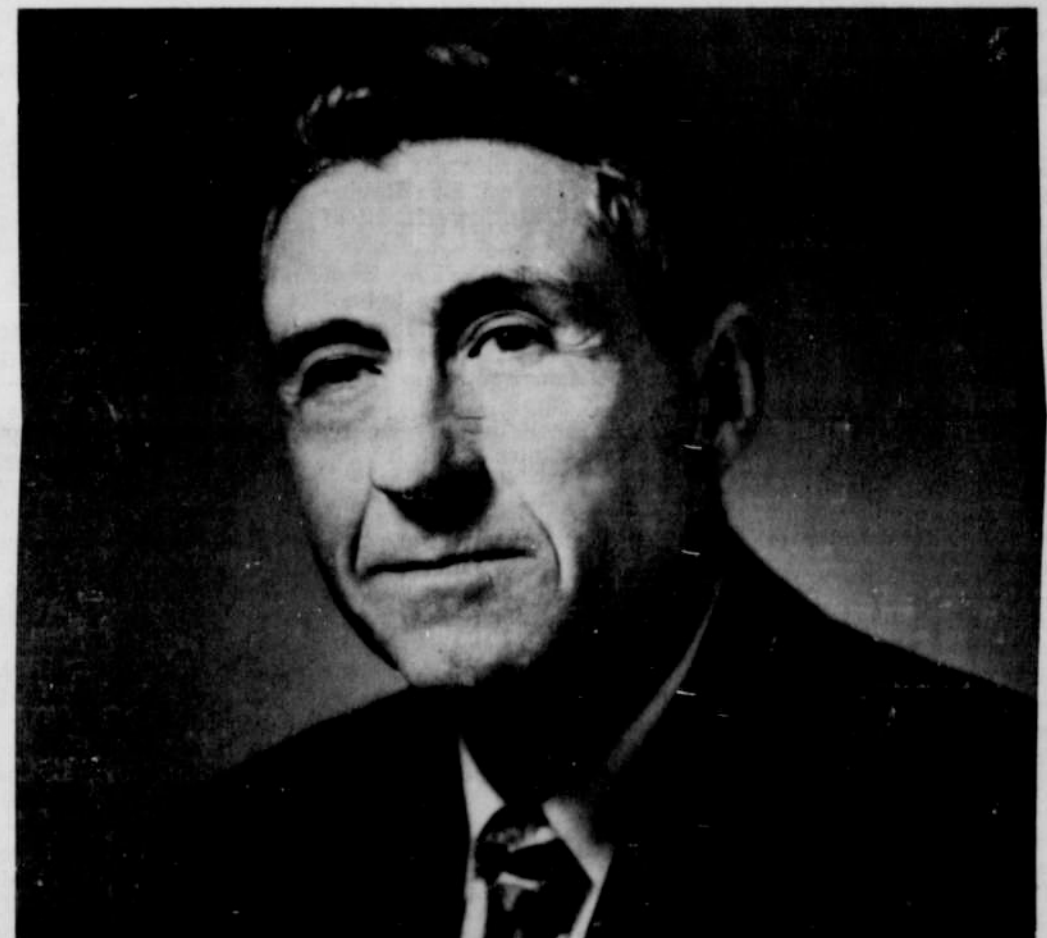
