Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WHAT CAUSES STARCH TO STICK TO THE IRON?

. . . You may be making one of several mistakes. Don't leave cooked starch uncovered or allow it to get cold. A "skin" covering will form which clings to fabric. When the garment is ironed, the starch sticks to the soleplate.

Starch will also stick if the iron is not hot enough, if the fabric is too wet or if too much starch is used.

To clean the iron, sprinkle salt on waxed paper and iron over it. If the iron is cool, rub it with a cloth dipped in detergent water or use silver polish. Rinse and dry.

CAN PLASTIC DISHES

. . . be washed in a dishwasher? Most of the tableware is melamine plastic. This is not a brand name but one of the many types of plastic. Melamine can be put in boiling water or washed in a dishwasher.

To know the type of plastic you have, check the label. It will also give you suggestions for care.

To avoid stains, plastic dishes should be rinsed after use if dishwashing is to be delayed. Don't use harsh scouring pads or gritty cleansers on plastic. And don't put melamine in the oven or near a flame. It may discolor but will not burn or melt.

WHITE BLOUSES MADE OF COTTON FIBER

. . . turned yellow. Can they be made white again?

Sometimes they can be improved but not always. We suggested to the lady who asked this question that she soak them in one of the blue liquid laundry detergents, using it full strength. These products contain a brightener which is claimed to be effective on polyester. She called back to tell us it worked for her.

This may not always be successful. You can also try machine washing in very hot water—too hot for hands. Also, add chlorine bleach. The fabric will be more wrinkled and need some touch-up ironing, but the whiteness may be improved.

DOES IT PAY FOR A HOMEMAKER

. . . to take a job? How much extra expense may be expected if she works?

Studies in large cities show that extra expenses may add up to about \$15 a week. This includes cost of lunches, transportation, additional clothing, additional personal care and laundry, and social security tax. Part of these costs may be saved if you take your lunch or walk to work.

Some homemakers may also need to consider the cost of child care. Don't forget, you'll have to pay income tax on what you earn. We're not trying to discourage you, for there are advantages. The decision is yours.

YOU'LL GET EXTRA FLAVOR FROM CHEESE

. . . if it's served at room temperature, says Velma Seat, extension food marketing specialist at OSU. Take it out of the refrigerator about a half-hour ahead of time.

Why not celebrate Cheese Festival month by trying different varieties such as mild-flavored American Muenster? It's good with crackers and fruit.

WANT TO CUT COSTS

. . . on running your freezer? . . . Where you put it can have a lot to do with operating costs.

Don't put the freezer in a room that's heavily heated in winter or hot in summer. This could add 15 percent to the electricity costs. It's not a good idea either to keep it where the temperature falls below 40 degrees.

The freezer needs ample space around it at the back, top and sides, so air can circulate around the cabinet. This is necessary for escape of heat given off by the condenser.

ARE PRESENT-DAY DETERGENTS THE CAUSE

. . . of oily taste or peculiar odor in drinking water?

The U. S. Public Health service tests show that residues from detergents do not cause off-taste or odor.

When water tastes oily or fishy and is accompanied by foam, the taste is caused by organic contamination which is also present quite independent of the detergent residues.

"BY THE YARD, LIFE IS HARD

. . . by the inch, it's a cinch" Young homemakers enrolled in an extension management workshop thought this was a good motto for them.

When you have many different things to do, a lot of time can be lost worrying and wondering where to start.

Take jobs one or two at a time and finish them. Then you'll feel you've accomplished something.



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
