Although it says not a word about Christmas the song, "Jingle, Bells," is now a familiar part of the holiday season. The spirited description of "Dashing thro' the snow, in a one-horse open sleigh" conjures up visions of the old-fashioned Yuletide nearly everyone remembers—or likes to think he remembers.

Usually the song is thought of as "Jingle Bells," but early copies of the lyrics show that the title was really meant to be "Jingle, Bells"—with a comma added to make it a command to the bells to go into action.

Both the melody and the lyrics were written by James Pierpont, who was the son of a minister and who ran away to sea at the age of 14.

Pierpont wrote the song in the late 1850's, according to Encyclopedia Americana. He was then living in the Boston suburb of Medford where, at the time, the only piano in the entire village was located in the parlor of Simpson's Tavern. It was there Pierpont picked out the "Jingle, Bells" melody.
