## Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

### YOU NEVER CAN TELL WHAT MIGHT GET SPILLED

. . . or dropped on the floor during holiday entertaining. Be prepared with these answers to problems we hope will never happen. Remember, wax protects floors and keeps stains from soaking in.

**Cigarette burns, if not very deep, can be removed from hardwood, linoleum or vinyl by rubbing with steel wool dipped into soapy water. Wipe dry.**

For alcohol spots, try rubbing with a cloth dampened (not wet) with ammonia. Or you could rub with a cloth treated with liquid or paste wax.

Heel and caster marks come off with a whisk of steel wool dipped in liquid wax.

### ARE ELECTRIC CARVING KNIVES SAFE?

. . . A dull knife that you have to saw with is probably the most dangerous kind. You can't tell in what direction it might take off. But an electric knife requires no pressure; you just guide it. It stops instantly when you take your finger off the switch bar and you feel very much in control.

This type of knife needs to be used with the same care as any long, sharp knife. It does a smooth job with everything from turkey to sponge cake and tomatoes.

### MANY QUESTIONS ON STAINS COME

. . . to our county extension offices. If we were to pick five asked most often during the holiday season, they would go something like this:

**Candle Wax From Table Cloth.** First, scrape off excess wax with a dull table knife. Second, place the stain between several layers of white fabric tissue and press with a warm iron. Next sponge the spot with dry cleaning fluid or spot remover. Or if safe for the fabric, pour boiling water through the stain.

**Cranberry Juice** spilled on linens or clothing should be treated as soon as possible by soaking in cool water for a few minutes. Then stretch the fabric over a bowl and pour boiling water through the stained area. Next, wash in hot sudsy water. If safe for fabric, use chlorine bleach in the wash water.

**Coffee on Carpet.** Sponge stain immediately with a solution made by mixing one teaspoon vinegar, one teaspoon mild detergent (not soap) and one quart water. Blot up as much moisture as possible with clean white terry towels or paper towels.

If coffee contained cream, apply dry cleaning fluid also. Place several thicknesses of clean white cloth or paper towels over spot and weight down with a stack of books. It's important to work quickly.

**Crepe Paper Stains on Carpet.** These are usually impossible to remove by home methods. Call a professional rug cleaner. Be on guard and try not to let this happen. Keep colored paper decorations, ribbons and wrappings off the rug where they might get stepped on by damp shoes.

**Lipstick From Napkins.** Before laundering, rub undiluted liquid detergent into the stain. Or dampen spot and rub powdered detergent into it until the spot is gone, then rinse thoroughly. You may need to repeat this and it will help to dry the fabric between times.

## Floods, Auto Mishap Injuries Quell Yule Happiness for Fenns

Newell Heights—Mr. and Mrs. Duane Fenn and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Fenn started home from Portland on Tuesday morning, Dec. 22. Duane had been released from a hospital in the Rose city with plans to spend the Christmas holidays with his family.

The two couples became stranded at The Dalles, due to flooding conditions and were forced to spend two days in a motel there.

On the third day, they started again on their journey home, got to Bend and just after they had crossed the pass, learned that the road was closed behind them.

While at Bend, the Carl Fenns received word that their son, Kenneth of Maple Valley, had been injured in an automobile mishap and was hospitalized in Renton, Wash. They boarded a plane to Renton, while the Duane Fenns continued on their trip home to Ontario.

The injured son was returning home from work, hit a slick spot in the road, his vehicle struck a telephone pole and was demolished.

Reports are that all of his ribs were broken on one side of his body, with two broken on the other side. One of his lungs was torn loose and the other was punctured. After being hospitalized a tube was inserted into his throat to aid his breathing.

He is reported to be showing some improvement at the present time.

Duane returned to the hospital in Portland Monday, hoping that he will be released permanently in the near future. He became very ill on Nov. 21 and was flown to the Rose city hospital where he has since been a patient.

## IT'S YOUR LAW

### UNORDERED MERCHANDISE

Suppose the mailman delivers to you a package containing a necktie—or a book, key-ring tags or a photograph record—that you didn't order. Either with it, or by later mail, is a bill or request to remit the price.

What are your obligations, assuming you don't want the merchandise? Must you return it? Can you use it and not pay for it? Must you keep it or can you throw it away?

Generally speaking, recipients of unordered merchandise are under no obligation (a) to return it; (b) to acknowledge its receipt; (c) to pay for it unless used; (d) to give it any particular care; or (e) to keep it beyond a reasonable time.

You are obligated to surrender the merchandise if called for in person by the shipper or his agent within a reasonable time. But you can demand storage charges before surrendering the item. If you mail it back at your own expense, you very likely will stay on the sender's mailing list and will receive other shipments in the future.

There are no postal regulations governing unordered merchandise, except where fraud is involved. However, if you know what is in the envelope or package, you can write "REFUSED" across the face of the piece of mail and hand it back unopened to the mailman.

No further explanation is required. You don't have to accept any class of mail. Further, your refusal probably will result in the sender having to pay return postage.

A ruling by the Federal Trade Commission holds it a violation of the Federal Trade Act for a sender of unordered merchandise to claim that "the receiver is under obligation . . . to pay for or return the merchandise." Hence, if you don't use the merchandise, you are within your rights in refusing to pay for it.

In summary, unless you want to use the item, in which case you should pay for it, you should keep it for a time and then may throw it away.
