Popular Seattle Minister to Speak At Meeting of Knife and Fork Club

Dr. August M. Hintz, popular minister and counselor from Seattle, will address members of Malheur County Knife and Fork club at their meeting to be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 12, at East Side cafe in Ontario.

Dr. Hintz has traveled to many foreign countries and concludes that America is the choice spot in which to live and raise a family. This, he states, is in spite of all its problems including taxes, labor strikes, crowded highways, the population explosion, foreign controversies and entanglements.

Dr. Hintz attended William Jewell college in his home state, Missouri, and received theological training at Colgate-Rochester Divinity school in New York. He then went into church service work in various states, finally settling in Seattle.

In 1953 he traveled around the world, making stops in Europe, the Far East, India and other countries. As president of the American Baptist Foreign Mission society, he spent a month in the jungles of Thailand.

Three years ago, he took a party of church workers to London, Paris, Rome and visited most of the Bible lands and Arab countries before going on to Hong Kong, the Philippines, Tokyo and Hawaii. More recently, he toured Africa where he visited the famous Dr. Schweitzer.

It is experiences gained in these travels that he uses in his address entitled "Don't Sell America Short."

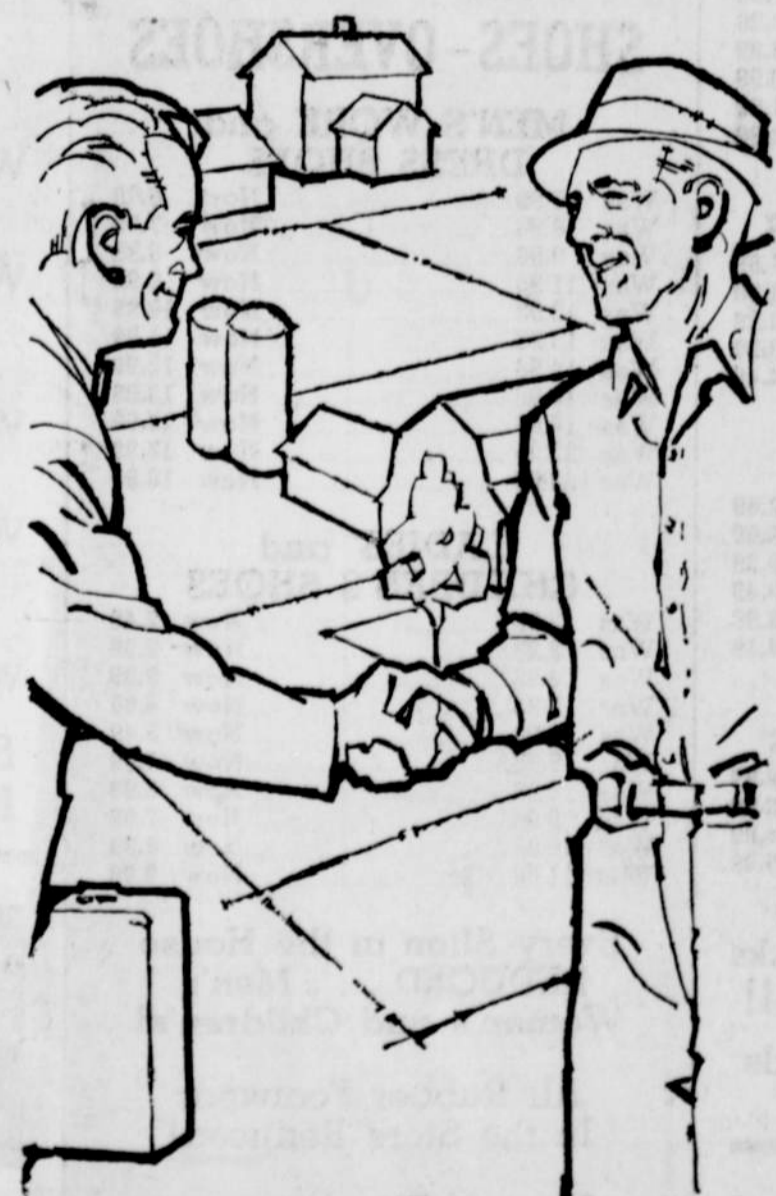
