RETURNS FROM HOSPITAL

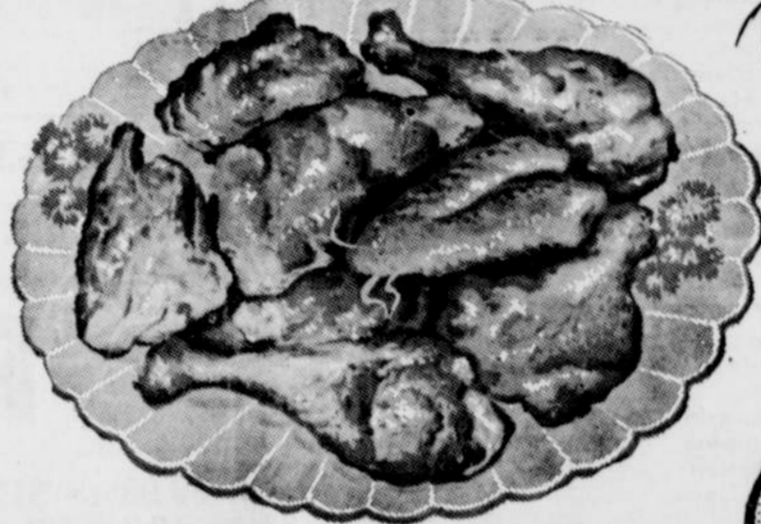
