Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

. . . of proven smart tips by working wives. In each column we'll tell you how one of these homemakers manages to lead a "double life."

A secretary, Mrs. K, keeps house for her husband and a student son. How does she manage, we asked. "I have a system and try (emphasis on try) to stay with it."

For instance, she cleans a little every day. Beds are never left unmade because this is a depressing situation to come home to. She rinses dishes in the morning, puts them in the dishwasher for washing at night. (We suspect that dishwasher is a big comfort made possible by her contribution to the family income.)

Has she omitted any activities or chores? Yes. Mrs. K quit ironing sheets because the dryer tosses out wrinkles if she doesn't overdry them. She's cut down on social activities, too, but doesn't miss them.

Does the rest of the family help? "My husband shops for food; my son does his own laundry and presses his school pants," says Mrs. K. Family laundry is a weekend job. Having the washer and dryer adjacent to the kitchen makes it easy to keep two jobs going at the same time.

As you can see, she's applying work smarter principles which are: (1) take a good look at the whole job, (2) omit the unessentials, (3) get family cooperation, (4) arrange equipment to save steps, and (5) have a plan.

. . . and prosperity? You might not have thought about it this way but increased international trade can do this for U.S. and Oregon families. So says Dr. Marguerite Burke, University of Minnesota economist, who spoke on the Oregon State university campus recently.

Foreign trade isn't just something for the officials in Washington to worry about. Homemakers are involved, too. Mrs. Alberta Johnston, OSU's Extension family finance specialist, points out that if Oregon sells more wheat, pears, lumber and other products abroad, farmers sell their products, mills can hire more workers who can buy more food and clothing, and so on.

The benefits continue to multiply. It's a never-ending cycle.

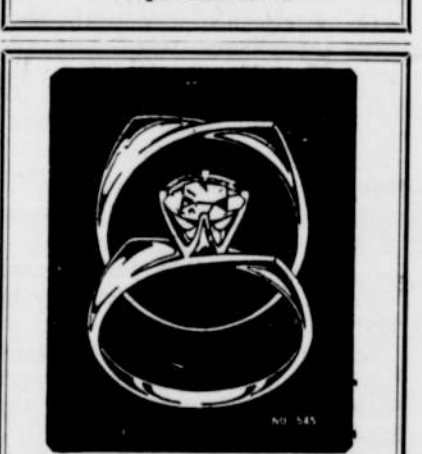
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
