Antelopes Handed Two SRV-B Losses In Weekend Tilts

The Adrian Antelopes found rough going during their weekend hoop tilts against the Parma Panthers and Kavemen of Kuna as they suffered two defeats at the hands of the Idaho lads.

During the Friday evening contest against the hosting Panthers, the Antelopes faced a 17-9 first quarter lead with a slightly thinner margin at halftime. As the teams went into the final period, the Adrian hoopsters had gained to within two points of their opponents, but when the final buzzer sounded the score stood 47-39 and an SRV-B victory was recorded for the Panthers.

Scoring honors went to Parma's Art Solis with a total of 19 points tossed through the rings. Counters for the Adrian squad were made by Munn, 14; Pratt, 10; Carroll, 7; Brewer and Martinez, 4 each.

On Saturday evening, the Antelopes played hosts to the Kuna squad who handed them another 57-40 loss. Kaveman Tom Butler and Adrian's Don Brewer tied for scoring honors with 23-all.

Additional Antelope points were made by Pratt and Martinez, 4 each; Munn, 3; Carroll, G. Brewer and Conklin, 2 each.

The Adrian lads now have a one-win, three-loss record in SRV-B competition; the Panthers' standings read 2-2 and the Kuna Kavemen remain undefeated and hold a 4-0 record.

The Antelopes will host the hoopsters from Donnelly-McCall on Friday evening and will travel to Middleton Saturday night for a contest with the Vikings.

Varied Problems Of Spud Industry Covered at Meet

A record crowd of more than 150 potato growers, processors, potato seed growers and others interested in the potato industry attended the annual meeting of the Malheur County Potato Growers association held Jan. 19 at Boulevard Grange hall.

Roland Groder, marketing specialist from Oregon State university, pointed out that the majority of growers in this area are highly specialized and well qualified in producing their own crops—fertilizing, irrigating, controlling insects and diseases, cultivation and harvesting. However, Groder continued, when it comes down to selling the crop, very few growers have the technique and skills of selling in the present competitive markets so as to realize maximum profits.

Groder discussed advertising and promotion, noting that 1550 pounds of food is annually consumed by an average individual. Advertising and promotion will not help increase the consumption of the individual but may influence the selection of foods.

A panel discussion on control of wireworms was moderated by Steve Besse, county extension agent.

A discussion was held on "Nor-gold Russet," a new potato variety which looks very promising for this area. Samples were exhibited by Joe Komoto of Ontario with performance and cultural practices discussed by Besse and Tom Hironaka, local grower.

An election of directors was held with Kay Teramura of Ontario elected director at large, replacing Clarence Lee, Ontario. Chauncey Steele was named from the Harper area to replace Laurel Amick. Directors re-elected were Tom Burns, Oregon Slope; Ray Russell, Nyssa-Adrian area; and B. W. Fulleton, Vale.
