Pomona Grange Adopts Resolution Concerning Bill; Discusses Taxes

Boulevard Grange was host to 35 members of Pomona Grange, Malheur No. 33, Saturday, Feb. 20. After a noon dinner served by the Boulevard ladies, grange met in regular session with Pomona Master Ira Price in the chair.

Pomona HEC Chairman Orma Cleaver announced dates of the sewing contest. She also stated that lack of report blanks provided by State Grange was causing some delay in receiving quarterly reports.

Agriculture Chairman Wilbur Atherton reported on an article by Dr. Robert Campbell which stated that Oregon was going against the national trend in property tax. He said, since 1958 Oregon tax has gone up 2.3 percent while the remainder of the nation has gone down 8 percent. The article stated that investors and farmers were becoming alarmed at the increase in taxes.

Legislative Chairman William Ross introduced County Agent George Bain who gave a report on 17 bills being considered in the legislature. He also pointed out that the 50-day limit is nearing for action on these bills.

Action was taken on the Change in Initiative and Referendum bill which would double the required number of signatures on a petition. The following resolution was written and signed by the resolutions committee:

Resolution Against Change in Initiative and Referendum
WHEREAS, the rights of the

people to request an initiative or referendum is being jeopardized by requiring an increase in the number of signatures necessary to place a measure on the ballot and

WHEREAS, we feel that any such increase would make it more difficult for democratic processes to function;

BE IT RESOLVED that Malheur County Pomona No. 33 oppose any change in the requirements of the present Initiative Referendum or Recall as it now stands.

Next Pomona meeting will be May 22 with Big Bend Grange.

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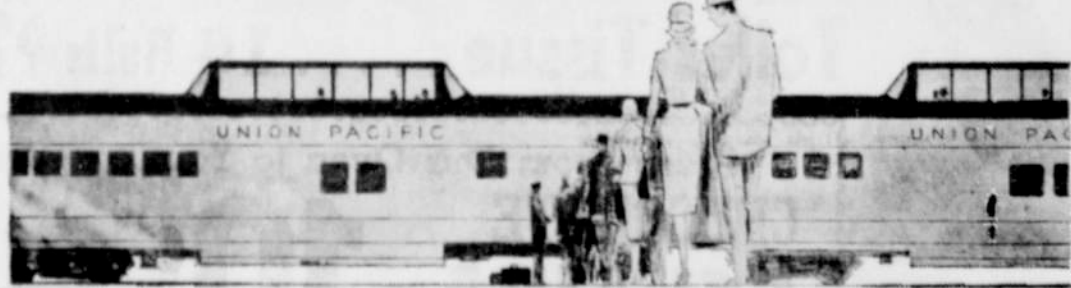
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
