Mr. Thomson succumbed last Thursday in Ontario. He was born Nov. 18, 1895, in Scotland and had been a resident of Malheur county for 44 years. For two years he worked as a sheep tender at Vale and then for 18 years operated a service station, store and motel in Nyssa.

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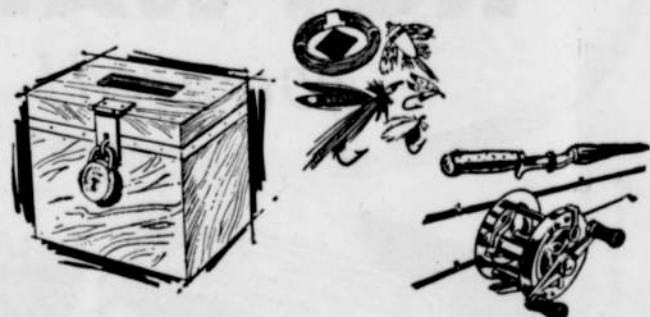
