"A Man in the Wheatfield" by Robert Laxalt. Father Savio Lazaroni was in one respect different from most men, or for that matter, most priests. He knew for a positive fact that there was a devil.

"The Man" by Irving Wallace. From beginning to end, this is a novel of swift and tremendous drama.

"Sudden Endings" by M. J. Meaker. This book includes 13 profiles in depth of famous suicides.

"The Rector of Justin" by Louis Auchincloss. This is a compassionate but profound analysis of a man's whole character—an analysis of his faith, his deepest personal crisis, his effect on others.

"My Brother's Keeper" by Dr. Stephen Sheppard. Dr. Sam Sheppard's brother tells the inside story of what happens to a family, a community and American justice in the grip of mass hysteria.

"How It Is" by Samuel Beckett. A creature in the mud, a human larva crawling painfully through primeval slime, carrying a coal sack of wet jute—such is the setting for this strange but wonderful work.

"Grapes of Wrath" by John Steinbeck. An "epic chronicle"—a poignant description of life as it is lived by the common man.

"The Iron Doctor" by Agnes Danforth. A thrilling story of a young diver and his adventures while working on the foundations of the great San Francisco bridge.

"Spanish Leaves" by Honor Tracy. This is a pungent and thoughtful portrait of a people, their institutions and their stark and beautiful land.

"The Fugitive" by Pierre Gas-car. This novel describes the flight of a hunted man. Having wounded or perhaps killed a Nazi civilian, Paul, a young Frenchman, escapes from prison camp.

"The Mouse That Roared" by Leonard Wibberley. The author again mixes sermon with spoof in the style that made "Mrs. Seawood's Secret Weapon" such a delight.
