Ralph A. Warren Speaks to NHS

Ralph A. Warren, director of research for the Oregon Council on Alcohol Problems, was introduced by the Rev. Wallace Prowell, pastor of the Nyssa Christian Church.

His research stresses the effects of alcohol on the central nervous system and society.

He was graduated from the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Loma Linda University in California.

Warren is the creator and writer of a news column, "Ralph Warren—About Alcohol," now being published in newspapers across the country. He has given 600 lectures in the past year and averages more than 500 appearances annually.

Tuesday, March 2, NHS heard a report from Warren. He spoke to the students about the effects of "subtle spirits" on the brain. He stated that alcohol affects every part of the body. Alcohol is a form of drug addiction.

He showed a film called "Verdict at 1:32." It dealt with the problem of driving while under the influence of alcohol.

The speaker stated that many tests made show that the legal level at which it is determined if a person is under the influence should be lowered.
