Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Friday For Mrs. Tain Long

Funeral services for Mrs. Walter L. (Tain R.) Long were conducted Friday morning, March 12, 1965, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Wallace Prowell, pastor of Nyssa First Christian church.

Mrs. Long succumbed the previous Tuesday at Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness.

She was born March 7, 1893, in Jackson County, Tenn., the fourth child of Wade and Medie Ransom. When she was four years old, the family moved to Scottsville, Ky., where she later attended schools.

On Oct. 6, 1923, she was united in marriage to Walter L. Long at Holland, Ky., and they farmed in that area until moving to a farm north of Nyssa in 1940. They purchased a farm near Adrian in 1945 and resided there until 1957 when they moved to 22 Green avenue in Nyssa.

Mrs. Long was a member of the Church of Christ, having been baptized at the age of 16 in a church near Scottsville. Among her favorite hobbies was fishing.

In addition to Mr. Long, she is survived by one brother, Hubert Ransom of Scottsville and two sisters, Mrs. Lucy Payne of Brigham City, Utah, and Mrs. Flossie Carpenter of Westmoreland, Tenn.
