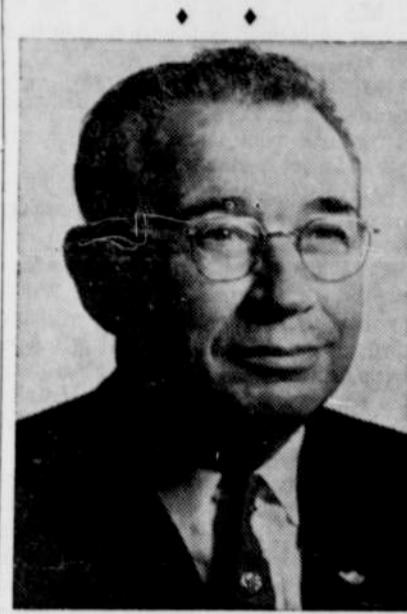
### ATTEND FUNERAL RITES
