Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WHEN YOUR CUPBOARD IS BARE

(well, not quite) and there's no time for a trip to the store, what substitution can you make when baking? Virginia Weiser, extension service nutritionist at Oregon State university, suggests the following:

In place of whole fluid milk, use reconstituted dry skim milk and add 2 1/2 teaspoons butter or margarine.

When you need sour milk, add one tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice to one cup of sweet milk and let it stand five minutes.

If your recipe includes coffee cream, you can substitute three tablespoons of butter plus 3/4 cup milk.

Even baking powder has a substitute. Use 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar. This is equivalent to one teaspoon baking powder.

If you have two egg yolks left over, use them instead of one whole egg.

In place of one-ounce square of chocolate, three tablespoons of cocoa plus one tablespoon of fat will do the trick.

WASHING GREASY WORK PANTS

. . . and children's play clothes is a problem in many families. Axle grease stains should be treated first with lard or cooking oil. Mud stains should be dried, then brushed. If stain remains, soak in cold water before washing.

A soak period in the washer is desirable. This can be done by agitating a small load of clothes for a few minutes with warm water and detergent. Extract the water and follow with a complete washing cycle, using water as hot as colors will stand and plenty of all-purpose detergent.

You can also add one-fourth to one-half cup of ammonia to the wash water to help remove grease.

STORE EGGS WITH THE LARGE END UP

. . . in the refrigerator. This keeps the yolk centered, says Velma Seat, extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university. Don't put eggs near foods with strong odors.

Cover leftover egg yolks with a small amount of cold water, then put in the refrigerator. Leftover egg whites are best kept by freezing if you are not going to use them for a while. Otherwise, store them covered in the refrigerator.

Some people fish out the white membrane when they break eggs, says Mrs. Seat. This isn't necessary. It is perfectly good and the more prominent it is, the fresher the egg.



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
