FARM BUREAU FURROW

Survival of Farming

Many people are lamenting the fact that over 2,000,000 families have left the farm since 1960 and the migration seems destined to continue for some time.

President Johnson hinted that perhaps we do not need more than 1,000,000 farmers in the land. This is because of the technical revolution which has launched us into the super-machine age.

An advertisement of a machinery company shows one man baling and stacking hay much faster than a crew of perhaps six men could have done a few years ago.

The drive to seek competitive advantage will continue and we will continually find new ways to add efficiency to efficiency. As the machinery becomes more complicated, the costs rise and claim more of the profits from the land.

The only way to beat the rising costs is to farm more land, which often results in buying out the neighbor's farm.

The mercy of the elements has not changed, and as the operation expands, the risk of losses from weather becomes equally great.

This brings in the case for the small farmer. He can usually stand the loss of a few acres from bad weather. The large farmer could experience financial ruin in the loss of a large specialized crop.

The acceptance of this risk has largely been transferred from the grower to the government through government programs. The advantage has been monopolized by large growers and has been a factor in moving the small farmers off the land.

Thirty dollars an acre is not much to a man with 20 acres in a crop. It is a profit factor for a farm with 2000 acres in a supported crop.

Since the large grower is more efficient and produces most of our food and fibre, the consumer benefits from low prices. But agriculture as a way of life is passing. It is big business.

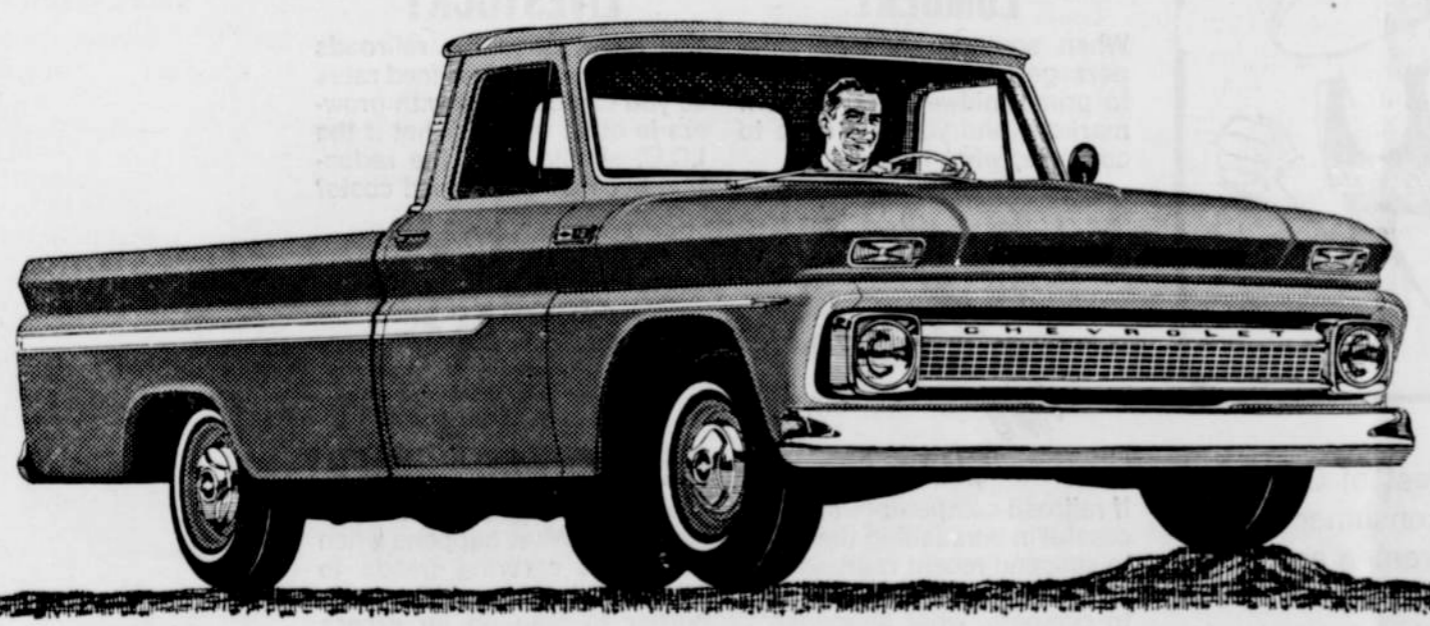
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
