Apple Valley Students Prepare Many Projects for Recent Science Display

One hundred and ten projects were displayed during the recent science fair staged in the Apple Valley gymnasium. Exhibitors were 87 students from all six grades, with each receiving ribbon awards.

Many hours of work went into the projects by the pupils, members of their families and instructors. Every seat in the center of the gymnasium was filled by relatives, students and other interested patrons on hand to view exhibits shown at the second annual fair, sponsored by the school and PTA unit.

Students in the lower grades displayed seed, bulb, pet and insect projects. Among those exhibited by pupils in the upper grades were motors, rockets, spheres and propulsion projects, while neatly made posters explained each entry.

Live Creatures Displayed

Among live animals and birds on display were an alligator, turtle, guinea pig, three hamsters, pair of finches and a pheasant. Also exhibited, especially for the fair, were Irvin Campbell's trained falcon and bobcat. Posters providing information on these, were prepared by his children.

Several rock and shell collections were also on display and a telephone system was kept busy all evening.
