Parma Services Held For Mentor G. Leigh

Funeral services for Mentor G. Leigh were conducted Wednesday afternoon, April 14, 1965, at Peckham-Dakan-Davis chapel in Parma. Officiating minister was the Rev. Wayne Wardwell of Kirkpatrick Memorial Presbyterian church. Interment was made in the Parma cemetery.

Mr. Leigh, who succumbed Sunday at his home, was born March 26, 1909, in the Apple Valley community and during World War II served for four years in the U. S. Navy. On Aug. 22, 1942, he was united in marriage to Nellie Magini at Boston, Mass.

He was active in Boy Scout work and for 14 years was a member of the board of directors for the Parma-Notus highway district, serving part-time as board chairman. He and his brother, Milton, operated theaters for several years in New Plymouth, Parma and Wilder until selling in 1944. Mr. Leigh was a member of Kirkpatrick Memorial church.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by a son, Nathan, and daughter, Susan Leigh, both of Parma.
