

Books on Public Speaking Techniques Available at Malheur County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, April 17, at Malheur county library include the following.

"The Chairman and Speaker's Role Made Easy" by David Belson. The author's examples set forth what should be said on such occasions as testimonials, installations, charity drives memorial services, patriotic observances and many others.

"Braude's Treasury of Wit and Humor" by Jacob M. Braude. Over 1000 jokes, quotations, anecdotes and epigrams fully indexed.

"Chalk Talk Manual" by Harlan Tarbell. A complete presentation of the theory and practice of this form of entertainment.

"The Ku Klux Klan" by William Peirce Randel. A history of the Klan from its organization in 1865 to the present day.

"The War-Peace Establishment" by Arthur Herzog. An examination of both proponents and opponents of U. S. policies on thermonuclear war.

"Man and Land in the U. S." by Marion Clawson. The author outlines the principal developments in the history of the use of land in the United States.

"Puritan Promenade" by Martha Bacon. Pithy sketches of five little-known New England women of the 18th and 19th centuries.

"The Initials in the Heart" by Laurence Whistler. The author's sensitivity as a poet and a glass engraver lends poignancy without sentimentality to this memoir of his dead wife.

"We Are Not Alone" by Walter Sullivan. The reader is given a tour of the universe as well as the historical background of our attempts to communicate with other worlds.

"Self-Renewal" by John W. Gardner. A study of society which maintains that social progress is dependent upon the energy, purpose and creativity of each individual.

"Using Commercial Fertilizers" by Malcolm M. McVickar. A book that deals specifically with commercial fertilizer—how it is produced and its use.

"Save Every Lamb" by Jesse Stuart. A collection of rich and memorable tales of a lifetime with the animals of the hills and farms of Kentucky.

"Modern Bathrooms" by Joseph F. Schram. Tips for planning, selecting the right fixtures and building a modern bathroom.

"Farm Journal's Complete Pie Cookbook" edited by Nell B. Nichols. Seven-hundred best dessert and main-dish pies.

"Reapers of the Dust" by Lois Phillips Hudson. A collection of vividly projected memories of a childhood in the 1930's enduring the blows of depression and drought in the North Dakota Dustbowl.

"The Sea Flower" by Ruth Moore. A tale of young adventure, orphans on the loose, a hurricane and a Maine island with a kindly old man.

"Don't Stop the Carnival" by Herman Wouk. A novel about a middle-aged New Yorker who takes a last gamble on love and life as owner of a Caribbean beach hotel.

"Bell Call" by Sylvia Ashton-Warner. A novel set in New Zealand with the theme centering around the education of children.

"Lament for the Molly Maguires" by Arthur H. Lewis. A Pennsylvania author who grew up hearing about the Molly Maguires of the 1870's writes dramatically of the lawless secret society of miners that was finally destroyed after its infiltration by the Pinkerton detective James McParlan.

"Discovering the Universe" by Bernard Lovell. A book that discusses the building of the English Jodrell Bank radio telescope.

"Heavens Alive" by Roger Pilkington. A British scientist presents his personal solutions to the problems which modern science poses for theology.

"Communications in Space" by Orrin E. Dunlap. Information is given on the communications development for the orbital flights, the growth of the Laser-Maser family and plans for the formation of the Communications Satellite corporation.

"Electronics in Medicine" by Lynn Poole. An explanation of how electronic devices probe the brains of the mentally deficient, ease the pain of epileptics, give longer life to heart patients and make it possible for the speechless to articulate.

"Pararescue" by Eloise Engle. An account of the role of the pararescuers in the U. S. Air Force Rescue Service.

"The Face on the Cutting Room Floor" by Murray Schumach. The story of movie and television censorship.

"Servicewomen and What They Do" by Karl Schuon. A career guide describing the opportunities the armed forces offer a girl in training and travel.

"Venture Inward" by Hugh Lynn Cayce. A quest for spiritual and psychological insight based on the psychic discoveries of Edgar Cayce.

"Old Forts of the Northwest" by Herbert M. Hart. A historical tour of old military posts.

"White Lotus" by John Hersey. The novel opens in the distant future as its narrator heroine tells of the struggles of the white race toward freedom from oppression

anyone arrested for driving under the influence of liquor has automatically given his consent to take a balloon chemical test of his breath.

Similar Legislation in 12 States

If a person refused to take the test, the arresting officer files a report stating the conditions of the arrest and the driver has 20 days to ask for a hearing or his license is suspended. Twelve other states have similar legislation.

The House of Representatives passed April 7 the Fairview Home budget after lengthy floor arguments. Opponents of the budget, who tried to refer it back to committee and finally voted against it even on final passage, argued about the level of services offered, particularly in regard to Fairview Home, the state institution for the mentally retarded.

Supporters of the budget pointed out it was an obvious political move by the Democrats to embarrass the Republicans. The facts clearly show that this budget provides a higher level of service and more adequate care for the patients of Fairview than did the budget adopted by the Democrats in the last session of the legislature.

Highest Level in History

Certainly any amount of money can be spent on state institutions, but Oregonians can be proud that this budget increases the level of services and care, and it provides Fairview Home the highest level of services in the history of the institution.

One of the "hot potatoes" of the session is in the Senate Education committee. It is a bill that would require mandatory unification of school districts. Opposition to the bill has already brought about removal of the mandatory "you must unify" features, but a \$4 million incentive fund has been established to replace it.

The unification law would bring grades from 1 to 12 under a single school district, eliminating separate elementary and intermediate school districts if unification is approved by voters in the districts involved. An amendment would permit the question to be resolved by an overall majority vote within the union high school district.

Yearly Elections Provided

The proposal calls for yearly elections on the issue of consolidation and provides that those districts which support unification would receive a share of the \$4 million incentive fund in proportion to the amount they receive from the basic school fund.

The House Education committee has had more constructive proposals than compulsory unification to consider. It reported out last week a proposal that would provide nearly \$100,000 for public school kindergartens in Oregon. Presently over 10,000 children attend kindergartens in 24 Oregon school districts, and this bill phases in over a five-year period additional aid to schools for kindergartens.

The House Education committee also sent to the Ways and Means committee a bill establishing the level of basic school support for the second year of the 1965-67 biennium at \$152 per census child, the level recommended by Governor Hatfield. The first year of the biennium has already been established at the \$152 level. The present level is \$133 per census child.

Farmers Warned On Registration Of Crew Leaders

Oregon Department of Employment Tuesday called attention of farm employers to the newly enacted Public Law 88-582, the Farm Labor Contractor Registration act.

This act, which became effective on Jan. 1, 1965, requires a farm labor contractor or crew leader to register with the U. S. Department of Labor if he "recruits, solicits, hires, furnishes or transports 10 or more migrant workers (excluding members of his immediate family) at any one time in any calendar year for interstate agricultural employment."

This law is expected to benefit farm employers in two ways. First, the interstate farm labor contractor whom farmers employ is required to live up to the agreements which he has made with the farmers and secondly, the act will benefit employers by providing a more stable and satisfied work force. Also it will benefit migrant workers by requiring labor contractors to provide members of his crew with information about the job.

Contractors Need Certificate

Farmers who plan to use migratory workers from another state are advised to have their crew leaders visit their nearest Oregon State Employment Service office to obtain information about this new law.

Farmers are urged to make sure that their crew leaders or labor contractors who qualify have a registration certificate issued by the U. S. Department of Labor when they report on the job.
