Other survivors include a brother, Clarence of Toledo, Ore., and a sister, Mrs. Charles E. Share of Nyssa. He was preceded in death by his father, Will D. Davis, and a brother, Earl.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis had recently visited relatives in the Nyssa area, as they were summoned here due to the illness of his mother.

In the Nyssa area, a class in farm records began April 19 and is being taught from 8 to 10 p.m. Mondays and Tuesdays in the NHS vo-ag room. Instructor is Grant Rinehart.

Those interested in taking this course should contact him. The class deals with development and maintaining of an adequate farm or agricultural record keeping system for any particular situation.

In the Arook area, a farm records class, also taught by Rinehart, will begin at 7 o'clock this evening at the Arook school plant.

A welding class in the Ontario area started April 16 in the TVCC technical building. Joe Gaddis is instructor for the evening classes which begin at 7 o'clock.

The course, for both beginners and intermediates, covers mild steel welding in all positions as well as specialty welding in cast, magnesium and high carbons in steel materials.
