School Officials Air Force Guests On Colorado Trip

Fifteen Malheur county educators were flown to and from the Air Force academy near Colorado Springs as guests of the Air Force during the first week of April to inspect the grounds, buildings, equipment and teaching methods employed there.

Making the trip were Superintendent W. L. McPartland, Principals Gene Chester and Muri Lancaster of the Nyssa schools; Superintendent Glenn Ward and Principal Bob Patterson of Adrian schools; Robert McCannaha, Ivan Patrick and Ken Glone from the Ontario schools; Carl Devin from TVCC of Ontario; and from Vale, County Superintendent of Schools Leroy Paulsen and his assistant, Bob Harrod; Jerry Camman, Jack Leafgren and Bill Spears of the Vale schools.

From Payette was Oscar Stauff, liaison officer between the Civil Air Patrol and teachers, who was largely responsible for arranging the trip.

Transported in C-47

According to McPartland, it was a most interesting and informative trip. They left the Ontario airport Monday morning, April 5, about 8:30 in a C-47 plane and arrived about 12:45 p.m. in Colorado Springs where they were transported to a motel for the night.

Next morning they were transported by bus about 50 miles to the academy for a tour of the facilities. They were briefed by four or five Air Force personnel on various aspects of cadet training. Included in the tour were the classrooms, gym, church, administration building, teaching equipment and instruction methods.

McPartland said it cost approximately \$40,000 to graduate each cadet, that the teacher-student ratio was 1 to 7 and that he was surprised to learn the students do not receive flight training until after graduation. Enrollment is over 4,000, supposed to become career officers of the Air Force.

He said little mention was made of the recent cheating scandal in which over 100 cadets were expelled from the academy for being directly involved in the examination thefts or who had known about them and not reported to the proper authorities.

Trip Home Exciting

The Nyssa superintendent said the trip home was exciting and rather lengthy, compared with the trip down. The flight to Colorado Springs took slightly over four hours and the return about nine hours.

Weather warnings were out for the Rockies when they left Lowry Field in Denver Wednesday morning about 8:30. They flew to Jackson Hole in Wyoming to find the storm closed down over the peaks. They returned southeast to Riverton, Wyo., where they landed and had lunch.

Then the flight took them on a circuitous route to Livingston, Mont. (near the northwest entrance of Yellowstone park). They circled there 10 or 15 minutes, getting clearance and gaining altitude. From there they flew south to Twin Falls and on to Ontario. Landing was made at the Ontario airport about 6 p.m.—some nine hours after the flight from Denver started.

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an "open door" policy with no one being turned down because of their grades in high school or because of their inability to pay their way. Education Instead of Welfare

In answer to the question of when local cost might cease rising, Rinehart said he did not know, but personally would much prefer to spend for education than for welfare.

The state board of education, meeting in Salem yesterday, was asked to approve tuition raises for district residents from \$225 to \$240 per year and for state residents, out-of-district, from \$255 to \$270. Out-of-state students are now paying \$390 (set by the local board) and will pay \$405 for the coming year.

Vale Elementary will submit the same budget figures May 3 as rejected by only a 13-vote margin in the first election. Ontario 8-C has not yet settled on the figures to be voted on at its second election. The original budget asking for \$1.5 million was defeated by 758 votes (1206 to 448).

In Ontario, Incumbent Frank Blankinship is unopposed. A vacancy created by the resignation of Robert Humphreys will be filled by the board after the election as it came too late to be voted on by district patrons.

Area Legislators Report Activities Of House and Senate Bodies at Salem

House Bill 1001 was undoubtedly one of the most controversial bills of the session. It was a carryover of Measure No. 3 on the November ballot and involved increased payments for injured workmen and the right of employers to obtain insurance coverage from the state, private insurance companies or to be self-insurers.

This bill passed the Senate and will now return to the House for action on the Senate amendments.

Farmers have been included in the bill, and coverage extends to those engaged in stoop labor as well as those working with machinery. However, by action taken in the Senate, the act will not become effective as to farmers until Jan. 1, 1968.

This will allow the farmers and insurance companies time to gain an experience history as to coverage and rates. At the present time, the establishment of rates for farmers would be largely guesswork.

While some factions of labor still oppose the bill, it should be pointed out that benefits for the injured workmen are increased by more than 25 percent which is a long step forward.

Cigarette Tax Referred

The House has passed HB 1207 which imposes a four-cent tax on each package of cigarettes, but the action is to be referred to the people for their vote. If this proposal is finally accepted, Oregon will join the remainder of the states insofar as concerns a cigarette tax.

All efforts to increase the gasoline tax and car license fees have been thwarted. As a result, the plight of cities and counties for road, bridge and street construction and maintenance appears to be in jeopardy.

The Senate Highways committee approved and sent to the Ways and Means committee Senate Bill 363, which will give an additional one-half of one percent (.05%) each year to the cities for five years, and then 12½ percent continuously after five years, from state highway funds.

Cities' Position Enhanced

They presently receive 10 percent and are having difficulty making ends meet. If SB 363 becomes law, the position of cities of Oregon will be substantially enhanced.

The Senate Highways committee also passed and sent SB No. 367 to Ways and Means. By supreme court decision, the general fund was ordered to return \$6.8 million to the highway fund. SB 367 provides that of this \$6.8 million, the cities will receive one-fourth; counties, one-fourth; and the remaining one-half will go to the state for state construction of highways.

This is a "one-shot" proposition, since it will not occur again, but it should help the counties and cities, particularly to alleviate some of the flood damage that has been suffered.

The House has passed HB 1507, which provides for use of basic

school support for establishment of kindergartens. It is an additional erosion of basic school support funds.

Many districts now have kindergartens. The districts now have the right to establish and maintain them, but basic school money from the state has not been used for this purpose.

The governor has signed HB 1305 which permits farmers, or members of their immediate families, to use farm licensed vehicles for personal purposes. This will terminate the threat of arrest when farmers use their pickups to take their children to school, to buy groceries or to go fishing.

New Farm Appraisal Planned

The House passed a monumental concept in HB 1620. The effect of this bill would be to treat the manner of ascertaining the true cash value of farms in a different manner from other properties. Instead of using the familiar "comparable sales" approach, which is often inadequate, assessors are now directed to use "farm use value."

In other words, the "productivity" or the ability of the farm to return profits and rental values are to be used. If this receives favorable consideration in the Senate, and that now appears probable, there will have been introduced an entirely new concept of property appraisal.

Consider "Package" Tax Plan

The threat of a tax revolt in Multnomah county caused the Senate Tax committee to consider proposed legislation that would submit a "package" tax program. The "package" included a 3 percent sales tax; an elimination of the tax exemption of fraternal organizations, senior citizens, deciduous trees and others. It also provided a 2 percent limitation on true cash value of property.

Districts having a levy of more than 2 percent, however, would be compensated from sales tax funds for the loss occasioned by the 2 percent limitation. This would certainly be rewarding the extravagant districts and penalizing the thrifty. We are confident this proposal will never see the light of day!

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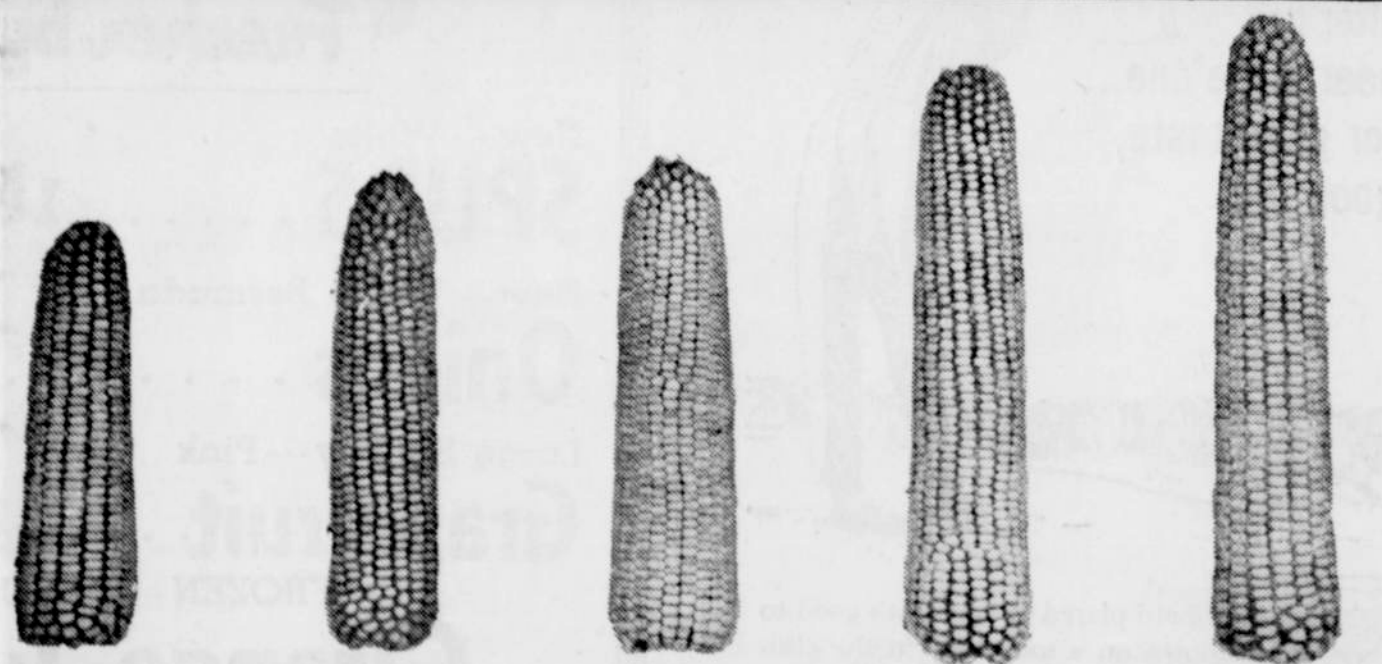
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
