



Salem Scene

Members of the legislative ways and means committee are likely to take a closer look at what's behind the term "other funds" in future state agency budgets, Senator L. W. Newbry (R-Ashland) revealed in a Salem Scene interview this week.

Newbry, who is a member of the powerful joint ways and means committee, said the committee has uncovered nearly \$1 million of federal funds which have "crept into state agency budgets" without the knowledge or consent of the legislature.

Newbry said he is not opposed to the use of federal tax funds for state research and assistance projects, but the ultimate dependency on the state to continue these programs after a couple of years will "cause a serious drain on state tax revenues."

He indicated that eager administrators of various state departments are applying for federal funds for study and assistance programs in Oregon. They receive the money and start the project between legislative sessions, and the dollar amounts show up as a continuing program at the next legislature.

Newbry said these programs largely begin as investigation-type studies and assistance grants but like most other government programs, "once they are started, they grow and continue." Thus, he declared, when federal funds are exhausted, the financial demand for continuing a program is placed on Oregon state taxpayers.

"I am much alarmed," said Newbry, "at this gradual creeping by executive decision of federally financed programs which, after the funds are depleted, will place an additional demand on Oregon taxes."

Newbry said the hidden implication of these programs is that state department heads are legislating new state programs without the consent of the people's elected representatives.

Included in budgets for this biennium, Newbry cited the following examples from a few agency budgets:

—\$89,920 under the board of health is destined for prenatal care of unwed mothers in the Albina district of Portland.

—\$80,000 under the commission

for the blind is devoted to determine what might be done for children who have other handicaps (provides for better than 1-to-1 patient-staff ratio).

—\$28,000 under the board of health is being used for a clean air project which, Newbry said, is "in addition to the board's statutory responsibilities."

—\$299,000 is being spent on a state Hospital Improvement program (HIP).

—\$89,000 under the U.S. Children's bureau is headed for vaccinating children under 5 years of age.

—\$272,660 under the Mental Health division is being spent on a patient-family project at the Eastern Oregon State hospital to determine the relationship of patients and family.

—\$75,000 will be used to finance a Hospital Reaches for the Community program where social workers see how mental patients are working into the community. Most of these federal programs have a time limit and the state is expected to continue them after funds and time run out.

Newbry said "executive decisions to begin these programs have usurped the responsibility of the legislature to make policy decisions as to whether or not these programs are essential to the people of Oregon." Likewise, he said there is "no representative thought given to the fact that these programs may be continued in the future at state taxpayer expense."

Newbry indicated that some provision should be made for "legislative review" before any new programs are begun.

The FBI agent investigating them said that Humphreys had instigated the complaint. A call to FBI agent Davis in Ontario, following these conversations, brought his statement that he was not at liberty to reveal the complainant. So it remains a mystery for the time being.

In the meantime, it might be explained that the Gate City Journal has not increased nor decreased rates since 1959, nor has it carried any ads in its issues that have been subsequently carried in either the "Reporter" or competitive shopper, the "Reminder," at any rates.

Background Given

The "Reporter" was organized about seven months ago with Stan Thompson of Nyssa; Gordon Capps, chairman of the company owning KSRV; Humphreys, Clint Bellows and Chuck Harland, all associated with KSRV, as incorporators of the publication.

It is known as Inland Publishing company and the radio is incorporated under the name of Inland Broadcasting company.

Thompson is editor and the publication is printed off-set at Pendleton, Ore., covers the lower Treasure Valley and is a free throw-away, having no subscription list.

In commenting on the charge, publisher Brammer said, "It may be an honor to be thought of along with the industrial giants like DuPont and General Motors in violating the anti-trust laws, but it is rather humiliating to have your competitors learn your rates are too low before you announce it to your advertisers."
