

Tigers, Grizzlies Capture Honors In SRV Track Meet Held at Ontario

The Ontario Tigers, paced by a one-two sweep in both hurdles, grabbed five first places and set three records as they racked up 51 1/2 points to win the SRV-A track title in the Saturday meet on their home field.

Nyssa finished in second place with 31 1/2 points, Emmett hustled into third with 22 1/2 and Weiser took fourth spot with 21 counters, followed by Vale, 19 1/2; Meridian, 18; Vallivue, 13; Payette, 10.

Nyssa Scores 3-1 Win Over Payette In SRV-A Contest

Payette suffered its first SRV-A league baseball defeat Friday afternoon when the Pirates fell 3-1 to the hosting Nyssa Bulldogs. John Moore limited the Idaho lads to three hits as he led Nyssa to victory over the league-leading Pirates.

The Bulldogs got all the runs they needed in the first inning when they scored three hits off pitcher Joe Grief. Payette came back for its only run in the fourth stanza when Grief and Warren Meador hit back-to-back doubles.

The local team scored its three runs on a pair of singles, a double and a walk. Gerald Wyckoff advanced to first base on a single, Myron McCrady walked and Dick Meisinger hit a double, scoring Wyckoff. Gary Mason's single advanced McCrady and Meisinger across home plate.

Batteries for the Bulldogs were Moore and Sid Lancaster. The defeat was Payette's first after six straight wins. Nyssa's record now stands 4-3 in SRV-A league play.

In SRV-B competition, the Fruitland Grizzlies took top honors by capturing nine firsts, breaking five records and chalking up 63 points. Homedale came in second with 26 points, followed by Kuna, 24 1/2; Parma, 17; McCall-Donnelly, 12 1/2; Middleton, 12; New Plymouth, 10; Marsing and Notus, 7 each; Wilder, 5; Melba, 2; and Adrian, 1.

Petrie Breaks Record
Among double winners was NHS sophomore Steve Petrie. He tossed the shot 55-4 1/4 to erase the old distance of 49-5 set by Nyssa Moore in 1960 and also tossed the discus 145 feet, one inch.

Another first place for the Bulldogs was captured by Vernon Maulding in the 440-yard dash with a time of :52.7. He also placed fourth in the 220-yard sprint. Corfield came in first in high jump competition with a hc of 5 feet, 6 inches.

The local lads placed third in the 880-yard relay and second in the 440-yard relay.

Other Nyssa points were added by Steve Kerby who placed second in the 100-yard dash; John Holton, fourth in the 880-yard run; and Smit, four-way tie in the high jump event.

Among 13 records shattered during the Saturday meet was that of Meyer from Ontario in pole vault competition with 12 feet, 5 3/4 inches, topping the 12-3 mark set by Nyssa Paige Zobell in 1962.

Long Stay in Hospital Ends May 1 for Lad Hurt in Farm Mishap

Calvin Cleaver was released Saturday after spending more than a month in Malheur Memorial hospital recovering from injuries sustained in a farm accident.

The lad was admitted on March 24 when he fell from a tractor and was run over by the machine. He suffered a broken left thigh and was in traction during his entire stay in the hospital.

Calvin is the 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Cleaver of route 2, Nyssa. His parents report he is most happy to be home and is recovering satisfactorily.

As told to a member of the Journal staff, "Upon entering the hospital and being provided with one of the well-known 'hospital affiliated' conveniences the lad remarked, 'Oh, you don't have to bring me that; I'll just wait until I go home.'"
