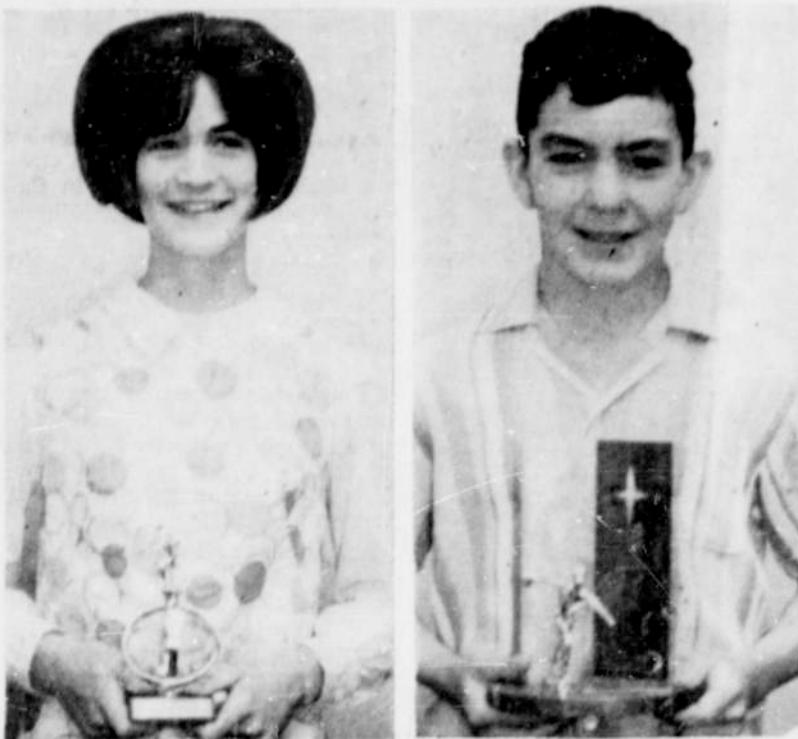
Allen Roberts was high scorer for the Gay Way team with a 213 game and 564 series, while Ken Brown was high point man for the local boys with a 200/541 game and series.

He had resigned his post in Nyssa due to his wife's failing health and desire to return to her home state. She succumbed in the car shortly after the couple left Rawlins, Wyo.
