Funeral rites for Mrs. Edward R. (Bonnie Lou) Brandt will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, May 6, 1965, at Lienkaemper chapel. Burial will be made beside her daughter, Mildred in Owyhee cemetery.

Mrs. Brandt succumbed on her deceased mother's birthday anniversary, May 1, after undergoing surgery at Malheur Memorial hospital.

She was born June 5, 1892, at Cabool, Mo., the fourth child of David Charles and Allie Margaret McBride Smith, and was a member of the Cabool Christian church.

In November 1910, she was married to Charles Julian Bradshaw of Cabool. Two children, Mildred Berenice and Howard Lee, were born to this union and both preceded her in death. Howard succumbed Feb. 21, 1925, at the age of 10 years; Mildred died March 14, 1963. Mr. Bradshaw succumbed March 16, 1915, from tuberculosis.

On April 14, 1934, the deceased was united in marriage to Edward R. Brandt at Ava, Mo. They moved to Nyssa in November 1934 and resided on North First street until July 1949 when they moved to the Kingman Colony community near Adrian.

Mrs. Brandt was affectionately known to relatives and friends as "Granny." She seemed to love everyone and apparently was loved by all who knew her.

In addition to Mr. Brandt, she is survived by a granddaughter, Mrs. Robert (Neva) Haney, and four great-grandchildren, all of Nyssa; four brothers, Will and Bert Smith of Parma, Leonard Smith of Boise and Fred Smith of Norwood, Mo.; two sisters, Mrs. Alvin (Estella) Hunter of Cabool and Mrs. Lawrence (Jessie) Hughes of Mullinville, Kan.

Other survivors include an uncle, Ben McBride of Jefferson City, Mo., and an aunt, Mrs. Will (May) Gerdes of Hutchinson, Kan.; four stepchildren, Clarence Brandt of Mt. Memorial services for David Barber Clarkson, 14, were conducted Wednesday, April 28, 1965, at the Children's chapel of the First Unitarian church in Portland.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Quentin D. Clarkson of Portland and a grandson of Mrs. J. I. Brady of Nyssa.

The youth succumbed the previous Sunday in Doernbecher Memorial hospital in Portland after suffering with a blood disorder which resulted in an extended illness.

David was born June 3, 1950, in Eugene. He was a freshman student at Benson high school in Portland, where he was a member of the Science club and served as an elected member of the House of Representatives.

The lad had been a paper boy for three years and was a member of the Boy Scout organization.

In addition to his parents and Grandmother Brady, he is survived by three brothers, Joseph, Douglas and Kenneth; one sister, Joyce, all of the home.

Other survivors include a great-aunt, Miss Kathryn J. Baird of Nyssa; several uncles, aunts and cousins.

Graveside services were conducted Saturday by Nyssan L. E. Robbins and interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery. David's brothers and cousins served as pallbearers.

State Requests Bids On Road Project South of Nyssa

Among the 17 projects on which bids will be received by the Oregon Highway commission in Salem May 18 is one in Malheur county.

It involves 7.48 miles of stone base and oiling on the Napton and Ridgeview county roads, FAS highways 827 and 922, about five miles south of Nyssa. Plans call for placing crushed leveling course and penetration macadam surfacing over a roadbed that was previously constructed by the county. Completion date is set for Sept. 15, 1965.

The announcement from the state office in Salem was dated April 27, 1965.

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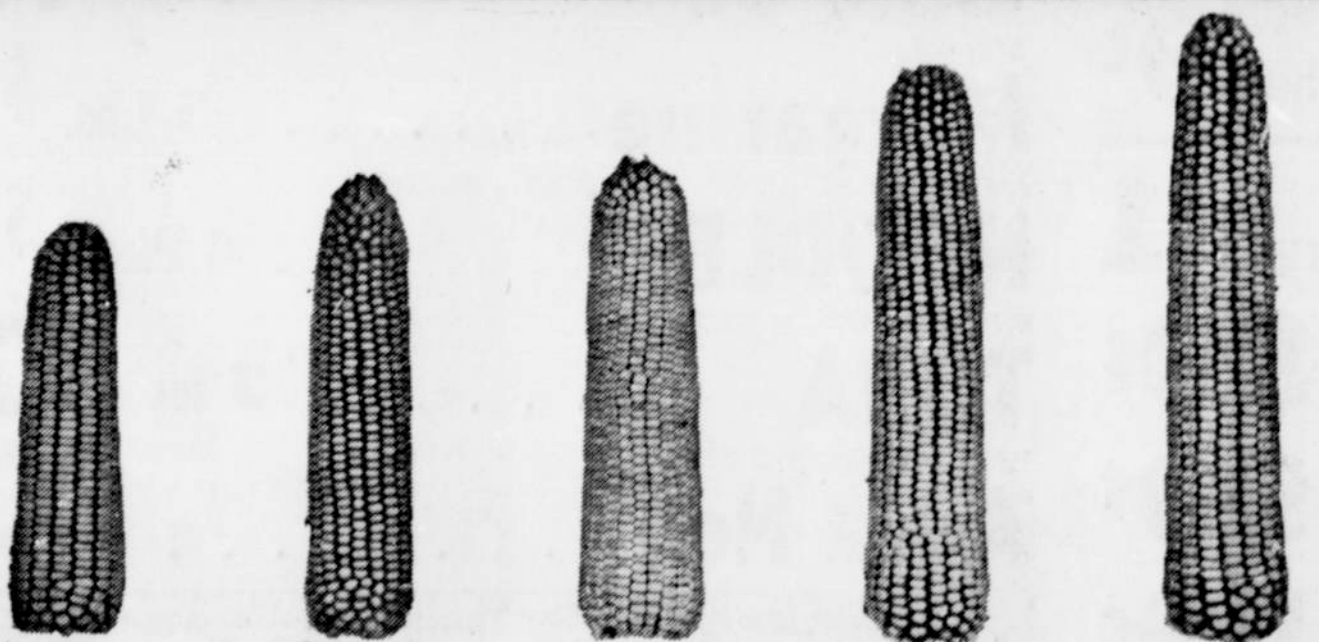
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
