The Small Society

While President Johnson is struggling to build the Great Society, members of his cabinet are hard at work attempting to create a "Small Society" in agriculture. This has become most apparent in a recent news story from California telling of growers plowing under some \$9 million worth of strawberries because of a picker shortage.

The shortage was planned by government and executed with the finality practiced by bureaucrats alone.

With the legislated close-out of the Bracero program and the dictatorial order by Secretary of Labor Willard Wirtz that growers must plow up higher pay for pickers, growers found themselves in a strange and almost unbelievable dilemma.

American finance and processing industries moved to Mexico to take advantage of the cheap labor offered by the "homebound" Braceros. The berries grown in Mexico are shipped back to the United States where they compete with American-grown berries.

The same problem became apparent in the date industry in the Coachella Valley of California. There, the \$7 million date industry faced disaster following an order from Secretary Wirtz that the growers guarantee every person showing up in the groves \$1.50 an hour. Piece work pickers were averaging \$1.57 an hour.

However, dates are imported from the Middle East in competition with California growers. Labor costs in those countries are about 25 cents an hour.

Our government is quite adamant about building two-way trade with other nations, and it is extremely difficult to maintain protective tariffs on agricultural products.

Therefore, with imports maintained and high wages set by government decree, farmers are rapidly becoming the "Small Society."

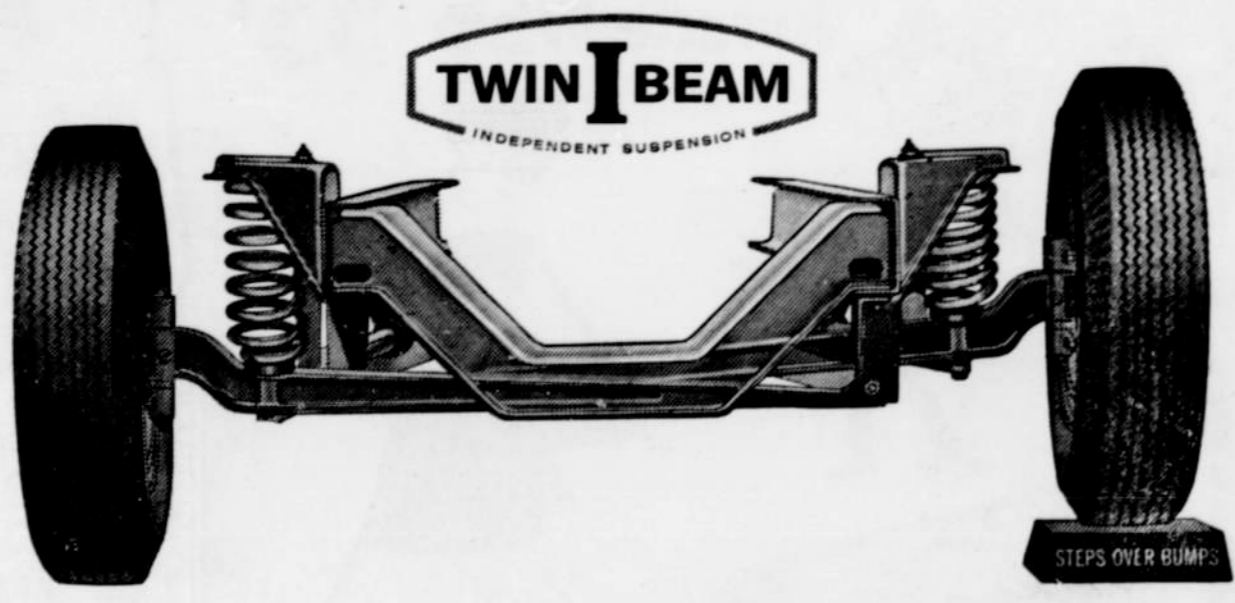
