Tuesday Rites Held For Howard Dryden, Owyhee Area Pioneer

Funeral services for Howard Dryden, pioneer resident of the Owyhee community, were conducted Tuesday afternoon, May 11, 1965, at the Methodist church in Meadows, Idaho. Mr. Dryden succumbed the previous Saturday at his home in Meadows.

The deceased was a second cousin to Mrs. Victor Marshall and Charles E. Share of rural Nyssa.

Mr. Dryden was born Nov. 7, 1890, near the Owyhee river, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall (Bud) Dryden. He later moved with his parents to Cambridge, Idaho, went to Meadows Valley in 1911 and had since resided in that area.

On Jan. 22, 1913, he was united in marriage to Minnie Clay of Council.

Mr. Dryden had visited in the Nyssa area quite frequently and attended the annual Owyhee pioneer picnics.

In addition to his widow and cousins, survivors include one son, Bill Dryden of Meadows; one daughter, Betty Martin of Portland; half-brothers, Buster Dryden, Meadows; Elmo Dryden, Portland; Frank and Bob Dryden, Lewiston. Five grandchildren also survive.

Interment was in the Meadows cemetery.
