We waded the creek and some of us did a little mountain climbing. Everyone seemed to have a very good time.

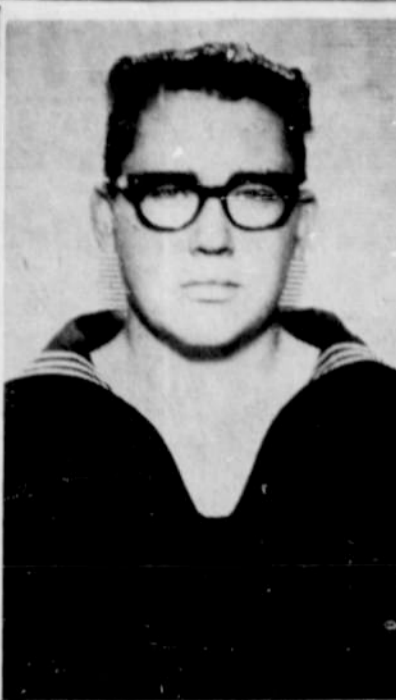
SENIOR CITIZENS HEAR WELFARE REPRESENTATIVE

AHS Senior Enlists In Naval Reserve; To Leave in August

A Mothers' day program was presented by the hostess.

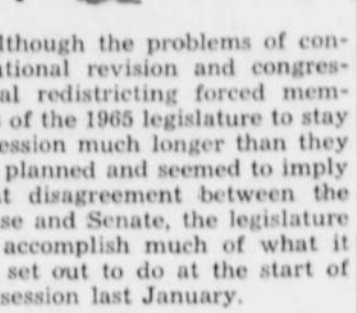

the amount per census child from \$132 to \$152 for the 1965-66 school year and \$160 for the 1966-67 school year.

The legislature also referred to the people a measure to place a four-cent per pack cigarette tax on the 1966 primary ballot with half the revenues earmarked for property tax relief and the remaining half split between counties and cities.

A measure calling for a change in the state's capital gains law to conform to federal capital gains provisions on individual income was passed which reduces the tax on capital gains by roughly 50 percent.

Business firms requiring inventories to do business got some tax relief with passage of a bill to phase out 50 percent of the inventory tax over the next five years at 10 percent per year. The legislature appropriated \$2 million from the general fund to local taxing districts to offset lost revenue due to the 10 percent reduction in the first year—1966.

And finally—in preparation of the 1967 legislative assembly—five legislative interim committees and a permanent tax study committee were approved. Interim committees will investigate problems in the areas of highways, agriculture, education, public lands and health during the next 18 months and recommend legislation to the next legislative assembly and the 11-member permanent tax study committee, which will be under the direction of the Legislative Fiscal committee, will study and review Oregon's complex tax structure and make recommendations to the next legislature.

Although the problems of constitutional revision and congressional redistricting forced members of the 1965 legislature to stay in session much longer than they had planned and seemed to imply great disagreement between the House and Senate, the legislature did accomplish much of what it had set out to do at the start of the session last January.

The controversial subject of revising Oregon's workmen's compensation law—a problem unsolved by past sessions—was achieved this year with passage of a bill to increase benefits, broaden coverage and provide employers with the choice of obtaining job-injury insurance for employees from either the state fund, a private firm or self-insure.

Also a controversial subject, Oregon's "Full Crew" law which requires six men on train crews was repealed, giving the public utility commissioner the responsibility of determining safety requirements for trains and train crews.

Substantial reform in Oregon tax laws was accomplished this session with passage of a measure allowing parents to take a personal exemption for students over 18 years of age providing they were full-time students at least five months in the year and a measure defining "head of household" to be treated as a joint return on income tax returns.

Property tax relief was achieved with passage of measures appropriating funds to local taxing districts to be used for "direct" offsets against tax levies.

A large boost in state basic school support to local school districts was also passed, raising
