Yearly 4-H Spring Dairy Show Dated June 7 in Ontario

Nearly 75 head of 4-H dairy animals are expected at the Spring Dairy show to be held Monday, June 7, at the Malheur county fairgrounds. All Malheur 4-H members who have dairy animals for their projects may compete at this annual one-day event, according to Mrs. Betty Jean Phifer, secretary for the dairy sponsoring group.

Animals will be entered in their respective classes on arrival at the fairgrounds, with judging of the various groups to start at 9:30 a.m. Ribbons for classes are being provided by the dairy breed associations.

In addition to classes for the animals, 4-H members may compete in a fitting and showmanship contest, with trophies going to top-scoring individuals. Vale Grain and Feed is providing the trophy for top junior showman, with Ranch-Way of Ontario and Nyssa giving trophies for intermediate and senior divisions.

Joe Pritzl, outstanding dairy breeder from Fruitland, will judge both the animals and the fitting and showmanship contest. Mrs. Ruth Robbins of Cairo will serve as clerk.

Lunch will be served by Malheur Dairy wives under the supervision of Mrs. Bernice Toomb, Mrs. Mary Laan and Mrs. Nellie Sprul. Free milk will be provided by the Grade A Producers association.

Students Desire Work to Finance California Trip

The Nyssa high school band has been invited to present a half-time show during the San Diego Chargers-Oakland Raiders professional football game on Dec. 19, 1965, it is announced by Frank Turner, NHS music instructor. The game and show are scheduled to be televised on national networks.

Turner states that the trip has been approved by Nyssa school board. Tentative plans call for departure during the afternoon of Dec. 16 with return slated Dec. 20. Among activities being arranged for the students are an appearance at Disneyland, brief visit into Mexico, tour of installations and ships at the U.S. Naval base in San Diego and a visit to the San Diego zoo.

School officials state that the major portion of expense money will be raised by the students individually rather than community contributions. Each student desiring to make the trip should place \$50 on deposit in the high school office, on or before Oct. 1, 1965.

Parents and school personnel are in the process of setting up an employment service for band members who desire summer work to finance their trip. Students living within the city should contact Mrs. Lloyd Wilson and those residing in the country should call Mrs. Mark Hartley for assistance in securing work.

Area residents having employment for students should also contact either of the above-listed women. It is requested that checks be made payable to both the student and the Nyssa band. Members are responsible for turning checks into either Mrs. Wilson or Mrs. Hartley.

If for any reason, students do not qualify for the trip, their money will be refunded, Turner concluded.

Auto Collides With Building On Main Street

A car driven by Al Chadwick, 73, Nyssa, went out of control about 10:30 Friday night, crossed Main street, hit the curb and blew out a tire. The vehicle then sideswiped a parked car and came to rest with one corner of the car through the brick wall of the Twilight Cafe and Lounge building at 508 Main street.

The auto was being driven from the owner's Nyssa Food Center when it hit the curb at the west end of the Phillips "96" service station and blew the tire. There were heavy skid marks through the driveway, showing the brakes were applied before the car hit a 1955 Chevrolet parked outside the Twilight by Norman M. Larson of route 2, Nyssa.

Chadwick told a Journal reporter that he hit the gas instead of the brake when he started into Sixth street and let the car get out of control until he hit the curb diagonally across the street.

Damage had not been estimated at press time but consisted largely to the 1965 Dodge four-door sedan driven by Chadwick. There was some damage in the Twilight from broken liquor bottles, glasses and an electric motor under the bar just inside the wall where the collision occurred. There were no injuries reported.

Nyssa Patrolman Richard Van Zante made the investigation and issued a citation charging Chadwick with driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Hearing is set for Thursday morning (today) in municipal court before Judge A. C. Sallee.

TB Skin Testing Report Submitted By Health Group

It was reported recently by Ray Buckwalter, program director for the eastern region, that the Malheur County council of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health association donated \$325.72 to the Malheur Health department for the purpose of buying 1,500 tubes for tuberculin testing in schools this year.

In 1959, the association purchased 300 tuberculin syringes for use by the health department and the work of testing was begun. Of 944 high school students, 109 were found with positive reactions, the highest rate reported in the state of Oregon.

In 1960, 45 previously unknown reactors were found; in 1961, 41 were found, while in 1965, there were 12 discovered.

The reaction rate has now declined from the highest to about state average. A reaction to the TB skin test indicates that the germ, tubercle bacillus, is in the body.

"We are particularly pleased with absence of the new infection among grade school pupils," said Mrs. Edna Blaylock, Malheur county public health nurse. "While our first testing showed slightly over five percent reaction in the grades, 1965 testing shows about 1 1/2 percent, average for the state."

Jack Blind, president of Malheur council of OTHA, mentioned that all projects by the association are supported by the Christmas Seal campaign.

"With the use of times, in the future, we could test each year all first graders, all seventh graders and all high school seniors," Mrs. Blaylock concluded.

Potato Commission Sets Public Hearing On Proposed Budget

Oregon Potato commission will hold a public hearing on its proposed 1965-66 budget of \$84,405, according to Steve Besse. The hearing is scheduled at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 9, at Moore hotel. All interested persons are invited to attend.

The potato commission always holds its June quarterly meeting in Ontario to carry on business activities. Sam Hartley and Roy Hirai, potato growers from Nyssa, are commissioners representing this area.

Besse stated that the meeting will begin at 9 a.m. with the public hearing set for 1:30.

Malheur County Budget Committee Submits Total of \$903,977 to Court For Approval During 1965-66 Year

New Mental Health Clinic Cost Accounts For Almost Half of Proposed \$43,336 Raise

The Malheur county budget, approved by the budget committee May 20, nears the \$1 million mark. The 1965-66 year starting July 1, 1965, is up \$43,336 from that of the current year.

The budget figures will be scanned by the county court at a meeting in the court house at Vale Wednesday, June 30, at which time any person may appear to discuss any part of this document.

No Highway Deaths in Malheur County

Malheur county came through the long Memorial Day weekend without any loss of lives on the highway or in any other violent manner, according to the Oregon State Police office in Ontario.

A United Press national count showed 490 traffic deaths and 707 from accidental causes of all kinds during the 78-hour period starting at 6 p.m. Friday and ending at midnight Monday.

The biggest single increase shown is \$20,377 for a new Mental Health clinic, an expenditure not showing in any previous budgets. Of this amount, \$16,177 is for salaries; \$2,455 for service, supplies and rent; and \$1,745 for capital outlay (office equipment other than \$450 to remodel the clinic room in the hospital).

Under general headings the following call for increases as noted: County General, \$49,605; Road Levy, \$11,650; County School, \$2,270. Decreases are shown in non-tax totals of \$19,739 and \$450 in county fair funds.

Increases in General Fund

Sub-heads under County General with largest increases asked for are: Miscellaneous, \$10,844; County Welfare, \$9,400; Assessor's Office, \$7,105; Sheriff's Office, \$1,105; Tax Collector Office, \$1,080; Vale Justice of Peace Office, \$966; County Health Department, \$910; Nyssa Justice, \$898; and County Clerk, \$870.

The largest increases under the Miscellaneous section are as follows: Weed Control, \$1,500; Office Equipment, \$3,500; Destruction of Predatory Animals, \$1,169; Official Advertising, \$700; Foster Home Care, \$500; Auto Replacement, \$700; and Election Expense, \$1,000.

These items make up a total of \$9,069 of the \$10,844 increase in this section.

NHS Wrestler Eligible to Compete At Tryout Camp for Trip to Europe

Dan Reece, a senior at Nyssa high school, is one of more than 60 candidates eligible for a trip to Europe later this summer when a tryout camp for Oregon prep wrestlers opens June 12 at Corvallis.

Reece placed first in the Oregon A-2 tournament to earn a spot in the two-day tryout camp. He is eligible to compete in the 140-pound class. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Reece.

Nine wrestlers, from 110 pounds to heavyweight, excluding 190 pounds, will make the month-long trip with Coaches John Platt of Corvallis and Bill Ryder of Grants Pass.

To qualify for the tryout camp, a wrestler must have placed at least fourth in the state AAU freestyle meet or have won a state A-1 or A-2 championship.

Top-seeded wrestlers in each weight are the AAU freestyle champions and challengers to the AAU titlists at each weight will go through a round-robin tournament on Saturday, June 12.

Winners of the round-robin tournaments earn the right to meet the AAU champs in a best-of-three series on Sunday, June 13, with the winner getting the European team spot.

Following a 12-day training program, the Oregon prep team will leave for Copenhagen, Denmark, on June 25, arriving the following day.

From then until July 12, the team will tour Sweden, then continue on to Poland for nine more days of matches.

Highlight of the trip will be the July 21-22 International Youth Tournament in Danzig, Poland. The tourney will be attended by high school wrestlers from six Communist countries, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Russia, Rumania, Poland and East Germany, as well as the Oregon and Swedish delegations.

The team will leave Poland on July 25 for Helsinki, Finland. Other matches may be arranged with Finland, Norway or Denmark, after which the team will return home about Aug. 1.

Nyssa Firms Plan Downtown Mall For Parking at Second and Main

Houston Wilson, president of Wilson's Markets, Inc., announced this week that the firm had acquired the old Chevron Station building and property at the corner of Second and Main street from Mrs. Nellie Powell.

He said it was the intent, in the near future, in conjunction with the First National Bank of Oregon, Bracken's Department store and Nyssa Pharmacy to demolish the old building and blacktop the lot to provide additional parking for downtown customers.

This area, along with the present parking lot at Wilson's, will be beautified with potted trees or shrubs and increased lighting, conforming with parking malls—so popular in many cities.

Wilson said this was a "step forward in modernizing and keeping abreast of the times and indicated the faith of the firms in the future growth and progress of the Nyssa area."

To Be Completed Next May

Start of the project depends on when possession of the building can be obtained. The Nyssa-Nampa Beet Growers association laboratory occupies part of the structure and unless they can find another suitable location for their work the new owners must wait until the end of the one-year lease. In any event, Wilson said, the project will be completed not later than May of next year.
