

Engineer Reports Motor Wear Saved With Air Cleaner, Oil Filter Checks

Regular servicing of both the air cleaner and oil filter on the farm tractor will save considerable money in the long run, according to M. G. Huber, extension agricultural engineer at Oregon State University.

Huber points out that dirt can wreck a tractor or other automotive engines. Dirt enters an engine through a dirty oil filter or a dirty air cleaner.

His letter concluded, "Considering the number of Jaycees there are, the turnover and this program being open to all countries in JCI, my number 4836 seems rather small."

Moore is a graduate of Adrian high school, College of Idaho in Caldwell and has taught in the Idaho school system since 1956.
