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BEFORE YOU LEAVE ON VACATION

... check your refrigerator and freezer plugs to be sure they cannot accidentally get pulled out while you're away.

We often receive calls at our county extension offices about this unfortunate circumstance. Food spoils; money is wasted. And it's a messy clean up job, to say the least.

Be safe; install a twist lock receptacle and plug. This can't get knocked out. Then you won't be assured this accident won't happen.

IS HARD WATER BETTER FOR YOUR TEETH

... than soft water? This question was asked recently when we gave educational programs on hard water problems to groups of homemakers.

We consulted Dr. Gertrude Tank, the dentist who conducts research on nutrition and dental health in the OSU School of Home Economics. She says that studies in five western states showed that hardness of water supplies had only a very slight effect on reduction of dental caries.

Most effective in preventing cavities were the fluorides, which may occur in either hard or soft water. More than 2,000 children were included in these studies of tooth decay.

NEED MORE STORAGE IN THE BATHROOM?

Try these ideas.

Pole-supported shelves may be installed above the water closet or wherever you find space. Two shelves, 12 inches deep and 18 inches apart, will hold 12 bath towels and 12 wash cloths. A third shelf can hold cosmetics and dental supplies. These shelf sets, made in brass or chrome, can be installed by anyone, taken with you when you move.

If you are a do-it-yourself fan, buy shelf brackets at a hardware store. Get glass or wooden shelves cut any desired length.

If you need enclosed storage, shop for a shallow cabinet that can be hung on the wall or possibly on the back of the door. Open-shelf racks for the door are also available from stores and mail order catalogs.

WHEN SUMMER COMES

... youngsters look for more ways to play outdoors. Mrs. Roberta Frasier, OSU extension specialist in family life, suggests that the cardboard boxes you get at stores, plus child's imagination, can do wonders.

A box tied behind a tricycle makes a good trailer. Two or three boxes tied together make a train. One box can be a tug boat, another a rowboat. Cardboard oars and several boxes can serve as a fleet of rowboats and fun for several children.

There's no limit to the ways boxes may be used in make-believe play.

HOW DANGEROUS IS YOUR HOME?

... Maybe you haven't thought of it that way but every home has a number of potential hazards, especially for young children.

Don't keep pesticides near food, under the sink or in the medicine cabinet. Don't leave mothballs where children can find them.

Keep pesticides in their original containers, closed and well labeled. Don't save or reuse empty pesticide containers. And don't discard them where children can find them.

SHOULD A COFFEE POT

... be used if the inside finish is worn off and copper is exposed?

The OSU Chemistry department says that the exposed copper acts as a catalyst in oxidation of oils in coffee. This results in bitter coffee, irritation of the stomach lining and sometimes upset stomach.

You might investigate the possibilities of having the inside refinished.

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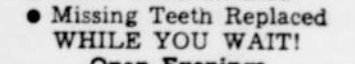
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
