Agriculture: A Community Affair

The Salem area Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee has come up with a reminder to all urban people that "Agriculture is a Community Affair."

A brochure extolling this patent fact is being mailed with bank statements in the area. It tells of the value of the crops in the valley and income they bring to the community.

The brochure is aimed at Salem mothers and dads and states the processed value of green beans and strawberries in the valley is \$65 million. It points out the fact that some 65,000 Oregonians earn over \$10 million picking berries and beans each year and that transporting and associated jobs add millions more to the community.

The brochure also requests parents to encourage young people to help in the harvest of these crops as their contribution to the welfare of the community. This is a factor largely overlooked by many.

Few areas of the nation have an opportunity for their young people to learn to work with their hands and to reap the rewards of their labor. Such work evokes pride of accomplishment and individual independence in our youngsters.

The number of bicycles, fishing rods and skateboards coming from the berry and bean fields is almost unbelievable. To see young ladies with berry-stained hands holding up frilly dresses in our department stores is testimony to the worth of the industry.

The valley is fortunate to have these crops. Those who would try to deter the youngsters from going to the fields are doing a disservice to both the youngsters and the community.

The Salem area Chamber of Commerce is to be commended for calling attention to the values of agriculture and the community.
