A search for Eddie Grijalva, 18, Nyssa, presumably drowned early Sunday morning in an attempt to swim the swollen Snake river near the Nyssa bridge, was continuing at Journal press time Wednesday.

According to Nyssa Police Chief F. E. Petrie, Grijalva had spent a considerable part of Saturday night drinking in a cabin here with Alfonso Lopez and Sibano Sigato, migrant laborers.

Nyssans to Vote
On Bond Issue
For New Wells

The city of Nyssa is asking residents to approve a bond issue in the amount of \$120,000 for the purpose of constructing another well and connecting it to the existing water distribution system, according to City Manager Fred Koch.

It is proposed to construct this well on the Idaho side of Snake river on property owned by the Seward family. Extensive investigations have shown that there is a good flow of ground water of good quality available, Koch reported.

The site under consideration will permit construction of four wells, one of them to be drilled under this part of the program. Steel pipe will carry the water to the Oregon side under the state highway bridge and will connect to the existing system ahead of the pumping plant and chlorinator.

This additional source of water should assure Nyssa ample water throughout the year at no increase in rates or taxes, the city manager said, as the cost will be paid from revenue derived from usage.

The people of Nyssa will vote on the issue in a special election Tuesday, June 29, to be held at the city hall between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. Council members approved the action at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night of this week.

Irrigation Water Supply in County
Rated the Finest Since 1958 Season

Malheur county water users are enjoying excellent irrigation supplies this season—the finest since 1958, according to a report released this week by A. J. Webber, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, and prepared by W. T. Frost, state snow survey supervisor, representing cooperating state, federal and private agencies. All irrigation districts are able to deliver adequate water supplies with stored water excellent and streamflows forecast to continue well above average.

Except for high elevations in the mountains, this year's above-average snow has completely disappeared.

Moisture remaining in upper watershed soils is continuing to contribute to streamflow. These soils now contain close to 96 percent of their moisture capacity on the Owyhee and 90 percent on Malheur watersheds in upper elevations.

Heavy rains on May 22-23 in the Jordan Valley-Triangle area produced heavy inflows for Antelope and Owyhee reservoirs.

Reservoirs at All-Time High

Stored water supplies remain at an all-time high and are 99 percent of capacity and 127 percent of last year at this date.

Antelope reservoir is full and ample water is available for the Jordan Valley Irrigation district this season with possibility of a good holdover for next year.

Lake Owyhee is full at 716,400 acre feet which is ample for the Owyhee project with probability of a good holdover for 1966.

Malheur river water users served by the Warm Springs and Vale Oregon Irrigation districts have ample water and should also have carryover. Total water stored in Warm Springs, Agency Valley and Bully Creek reservoirs is 277,400 acre feet compared with 147,100 acre feet a year ago.

Owyhee Flow Above Average

Flow into Lake Owyhee during May was 141,300 acre feet or 126 percent of the 15-year average (1948-62), according to data from U.S. Geological Survey at Portland.

Flow of all streams in May was greater than expected. Therefore, streamflow forecasts have been increased and now range from 122 to 145 percent of average.

Statewide, Oregon water users, already well into their 1965 season, can expect average to excellent water supplies, June through September. Stored water supplies are at record high levels and most remaining streamflow is expected to be near average.

The next report on water supply conditions in Oregon will be issued early in October at the close of the irrigation season.

The storage building and contents were destroyed, according to members of the fire department.

Reckless Driving

To Two Nyssa Men

Al Chadwick, 73, Nyssa, owner and operator of Nyssa Food Center, pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving Monday morning before Municipal Judge A. C. Sallee. He was fined \$100 and the court recommended that he be given a driver's test June 18, 1965, "due to his physical disability."

Fidel Silva was found guilty on a reckless driving charge in Judge Sallee's court Monday morning. He was fined \$100 and recommendation made that his driver's license be suspended 30 days.

The charge grew out of an accident Saturday night when Silva rolled his car on North Main street and tore off a fire hydrant.

Ontario Boys Rescued From Crash
Of Light Plane in Rugged Owyhees
Tuesday by Boise Civil Air PatrolAgencies Cooperate in All-Night Quest
By National Guard Search, Rescue Squad

Three Ontario college boys were safe in Holy Rosary hospital Tuesday following the crash and burning of their light plane in the rugged Owyhees Monday night.

Donald Reay, 19; Gary Lackey, 19; and Hugh Fraser, 18, all freshmen at Treasure Valley Community college, took off in a plane piloted by Lackey Monday afternoon in search of wild horses frequently seen in the Owyhee brakes. They located some horses and followed them into a narrow canyon late in the afternoon when the pilot lost control and the plane crashed and caught fire.

Reay pulled his companions from the burning plane moments before it exploded. He then made his way to the shore of the reservoir where he was picked up by the unidentified owner of a boat and taken to Cherry Creek resort. A telephone call was made from there to the Nyssa police and to the sheriff's office.

Taken to Ontario Hospital

Nyssa Chief of Police F. E. Petrie said he received the call at about 7:15 p.m. Monday and he and Pheral Dodson, local hospital administrator, proceeded with an ambulance and took Reay to the hospital in Ontario.

In the meantime State Police-man Jack Spradlin, Dr. K. E. Kerby of Nyssa and Deputy Sheriff Dick Pounds went to the airport and started a search of the area about 9:30. The plane was seen leaving the lake airport by Mr. and Mrs. LaVerne Cleaver and they knew the direction of the flight start from the airstrip.

Cleaver used his jeep pickup for land search while Kerby, Spradlin and Pounds searched by boat until 6 o'clock the next morning. About midnight a 30-man squad of the Boise National Guard search and rescue section, fully trained and equipped for this type of rescue, joined the hunt. Two helicopters had come in late in the afternoon but darkness forced them to leave and the crews spent the night at Homedale.

Former Nyssan Sights Victims

At daybreak Tuesday morning the helicopters rejoined the search and Lackey and Fraser were sighted near the crashed plane about 6 a.m. Bob Love ex-Nyssa chief of police and now commander of Boise Civil Air Patrol, was observer on the helicopter sighting the victims. It was only minutes until one of the helicopters, with Dr. Kerby aboard, had the boys inside and on the way to the Ontario hospital.

Besides those previously named, Chief Petrie said others rendered service. He named Casey Jones, Ontario pilot, who appeared Monday afternoon and searched until darkness forced him to retire; the owners and operators of Lake Owyhee resort who stayed open all night and furnished what food they had for the searchers; Fred Bennett of Twilight cafe, Nyssa, who sent food and coffee about 3 a.m. Tuesday; and "Speed" Porter, local CAP commander, who set up a two-way communications system for contact with search parties and outside agencies.

The boys were listed as not being on the critical list Wednesday by a staff member at Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario.
