According to Mrs. Max Urry, Nyssa librarian, the following new books are now available for circulation.

"The Dark Side" by Damon Knight. The author has collected many of the works of major writers of science fiction—the best in this book. The reader won't be quite the same after he has read them.

"Sentence of Death" by Jeremy York. "You will be dead within six months," the doctor told Charles Galpin. But Galpin could not afford to wait quietly for death to overtake him.

"Fail-Safe" by Burdick and Wheeler. This book is the almost unbearably gripping story of several hours today, tomorrow or next year in which life, as we know it on earth, hangs in precarious balance and only a few very important people can do anything about it.

"The Year of the Rat" by Mladin Zarubica. This man's most intriguing adventure started after World War II at a hunting lodge in the Bavarian Alps. He meets Carlo whose tales of the Nazi leaders were, at the very least, startling.

"This People Israel" by Leo Baeck. This book is the great symbol of the divine mystery that human dignity can triumph over even the evil of death camps. It is important not only for what it says but also for where the author found the courage to say it, comments Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg.

"You Have to Go Out" by Erick Berry. The story of the U.S. Coast Guard.
